## SIGNAL CORPS MEN REINFORCE GEN. PERSHING

### Radio Unit of Company E is First to Leave For Mexico

Eighteen of Oahu's soldiers making up the radio unit of Field Company E, Signal Corps, Fort Shafter, will leave this afternoon at 5 o'clock on the steamship Sonoma on their way to the Mexican border.

This is the first and only contingent of troops from these islands to be sent to join the forces in Mexico. Officers who have left here during the last few weeks have had orders to report for duty there, but no detail of men has been sent from here before.

It is probable that this may be the only body of men ordered to the southern front from here, but as men at army headquarters comment, no stronger proof of the scarcity of war material has been brought here in a long while than the war order for this radio unit. It means that Uncle Sam needs men, and needs them badly when he must call 19 of them from the middle of the Pacific to do duty 3000 miles away.

One feature of the sending of these troops is the fact that this removes the only radio section that the army has on Hawaii. In all probability the vacancy left by their departure will be filled here as soon as possible, but this possibility may not occur until such time as the present plans for a larger army are put into working effect.

First Class Sgt. Stith G. McCutchen, Signal Corps, has been named through Gen. Wissler's orders to take charge of the little body of men, which consists of two sergeants, three corporals, 10 first class privates and two regular privates. The men will take with them a complete radio wagon set.

## REINFORCED IS NOW STATUS OF GUARD BRIGADE

### Orders Today Bring in Kauai's Infantry as Part of New Division

With orders issued yesterday at headquarters of the Hawaii National Guard, Adj.-gen. Johnson's command becomes what is known in military terms as a reinforced brigade, taking over the 4th Infantry, the 1st Separate Troop of Cavalry, the 1st Separate Company of Field Engineers and Field Company A, Signal Corps.

Announcement of his staff is made by Gen. Johnson as follows: Brigadier-adjutant, M. J. Lawrence W. Redington; adjutant-general department; aide-de-camp, 1st Lieut. George K. Larsson; aide-de-camp, 1st Lieut. L. M. Judd.

The command now embodies the 1st Infantry from Oahu, the 2nd Infantry from Hawaii, the 3rd Infantry from Maui and the 4th Infantry from Kauai. While the latter infantry has always been a part of the guard, it was not until today that orders had been issued making it a part of the brigade. As three regiments commonly make a brigade, the status of the command is now that of a reinforced brigade.

### SAY BELGIUM INVASION DARK BLOT ON HISTORY

Among a list of names of former governors, senators, railroad presidents, bankers, professors and journalists, Hiram Bingham III, a Honolulu, now of New London, has been one of the signers of a plea against the invasion of Belgium, known as "An Address to the People of the Allied Nations."

Declaring Belgium's invasion "a crime which can never be justified, and a blot upon the history of Europe," the address to the American people states the belief that the time has come for the United States to speak out against it, and to express a hope in the success of the Entente Allies.

## GUARD OFFICERS MUST GET LEAVE TO GO ON TRIPS

If you are an officer of the National Guard and you wish to go from one island to another or from one island to the mainland, you must first secure permission from your regimental commander.

This is the gist of an order issued yesterday at guard headquarters, made necessary, it is said, by the fact that there are so many officers in the territorial militia. The number to date is 231.

Officers who wish to go from their homes for less than two weeks need only verbal permission from their regimental commander. If the stay is to be longer than that period a regular regimental order is necessary.

Officers at guard headquarters express the belief that this order will be a great help in keeping tab on officers, which is always desirable.

In coming from other islands officers upon arrival here are also required to register at headquarters in an official registry book which will be provided.

Announcement was made today at National Guard headquarters that Sgt. ## WILL INSPECT KAUAI AND MAUI COMPANIES RECENTLY ORGANIZED
