LARGE DIVIDEND INCREASES ARE HIS PROPHECY

Unknown Honolulu Banker Gives Interview in San Francisco Full of Optimism

Considerable interest and no small amount of curiosity is expressed in business sections as to the identity of the "prominent Honolulu banker" interviewed by Charles Remington for the San Francisco Chronicle and which interview was published April 22. There are numerous surmises but nothing definite on the banker, has been learned.

No matter who gave out the interview, the statements contained in it voice the opinions that are held by large numbers of businessmen and it is therefore reproduced.

A prominent Honolulu banker, now in this city, predicts that the 1916 disbursements of Hawaiian sugar plantations to their stockholders will far surpass anything in the history of the islands. In fact, he says it is a settled policy of the planters to pay out in dividends practically all of this year's earnings. His views were set forth as follows:

"For several years the plantations have been building up large cash reserves against a possible period of free sugar and lower prices. It has been the policy to acquire and retain cash, over and above that required for current expenses, at least equal to one year's dividends. Most of the plantations closed the year 1915 with such reserves and many of them were carrying much larger reserves. Since the first of the year these reserves have been very much increased, for the reason that receipts from sugar sales have been much greater than dividend requirements at present rates. I know of one plantation that is carrying a cash surplus more than \$1,000,000 greater than it showed as of December 31, 1915.

"The risk of free sugar having passed for the time being, there certainly exists no incentive for increasing the cash reserves-in many instances already larger than the circumstances call for. In the face of these conditions I think the stockholders can count this year on receiving practically all the net earnings.

"The present dividend policies-inclusive of regulars and extras-were based on a 1-2 cent sugar. Very little sugar has been marketed at that price, and not more than 20 to 25 per cent of the outturns of the various plantations have been marketed at all. With raw sugar selling above 6 cents and the prospect that it will sell higher, it is conservative to estimate the net profits of the plantations this year will be \$20 a ton on their total outturns more than they counted on at the beginning of the year.

"Take the case of Onomea as an example. At the beginning of the year the company counted on paying in regulars and extras \$7.20 a share. Now the outlook is good that the company will pay \$11. The situation with respect to the other companies is similar. I estimate the maximum dividends of some of the leading companies as follows: Ewa, \$6; Hawaiian Commercial, \$8; Hawaiian Sugar, \$8; Honolulu, \$7; Hutchinson, \$4.60; Oahu, \$4.80; Onomea, \$11; Paauhau, \$4.60; Pioneer, \$8; Waialua, \$6."

Accepting the foregoing prediction with respect to the maximum dividends, and considering also minimum or present dividends, the yields at the market, based on minimum and maximum dividends, would be:
