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BUSINESS MAN FOR PRESIDENT

During a time of Republican surprises, nothing has occasioned more speculation in the ranks of the G. O. P. than the launching of the Business Men's Presidential League. This organization, which emerged quietly upon the horizon in New York, has local political sharps and dopesters guessing because it promises to be a new sort of ally, or antagonist, as the case may be. The propaganda of the new league announces that it favors a big, successful business man for President. It then proceeds to dwell upon the hugeness of the Government as a business concern as an argument for nominating a trained man of affairs, at Chicago, next June. "You should demand that the Government's business, which is your business, be directed by a President who is a real business man, and administered with the same economy, efficiency and results as any other business," is the suggestion the league is getting out over the country. One effect the league's work seems to be having is to put business frankly in the foreground as a political factor to be reckoned with in the campaign. Not in years has the individual importance to a hundred million Americans of Uncle Sam's routine activities been so vividly emphasized. Nor has the President been so sharply pictured as the biggest executive of the biggest concern in the world. Ormsby McHarg is the chairman of the organization. The offices at 185 Broadway, in New York, are reported to present a scene of intense activity. The league has spoken favorably of Root, Weeks, Estabrook, Fairbanks, Burton, Knox, McCall and Gen. T. Coleman DuPont, but it declares it has done nothing actively to advance the candidacy of any one of these.

MEXICAN CRISIS IS DEVELOPING ACUTE SYMPTOMS

Carranza Reported Moving Large Bodies of Troops Close to Border

[Associated Press by Federal Wireles] WASHINGTON, D. C., May 13.—Out of the jumbled statements from the border two things stood out last night. One was that the Mexican de facto government is moving troops to a concentration camp it has established south of Douglas, Arizona, and the other was that the two countries apparently are more hopelessly unable to agree than ever.

Even the bandits who are believed to have two Americans in their possession south of Boguillas refused to parley with the Americans who had gone to attempt to effect an exchange of prisoners. Recross Border.

As a consequence of this Major Langhorne with two troops of the Eighth Cavalry, has recrossed the border in the hope of being able to free Jesse Deemer and any other Americans who may be held prisoners by the robbers. The bandits are holding Deemer for ransom.

Douglas reported that arrivals from Naco bring the information that the Carranzistas are moving comparatively large bodies of troops to the west, but that their destination is not divulged. Two thousand Carranzista soldiers are said to have been sent out from that town, their objective being kept a deep secret. It is believed, however, that they are destined for the concentration camp at Del Rio, south of the Arizona border.

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KAISER HONORS RECALLED ENVOY, CAPT. BOY-ED

Received Decoration in "Recognition of Services in America"

Franz Boy-Ed, former naval attache of the German embassy at Washington, whose recall was requested by the United States at the same time it asked for the withdrawal of Captain von Papen, the military attache, has been decorated by the special order of the Kaiser in "recognition of his services in America."

IN WAR ARENA

BRITISH RECAPTURE TRENCHES AT HULLUCH.

LONDON, Eng., May 13.—The British headquarters reports that the counter-attacks launched immediately after the German infantry reached the first-line trenches at Hulluch resulted in the recapture of almost all of the ground lost, although the Germans still hold some of the outlying trenches.

BERLIN HEARS OF MUTINY IN ITALIAN ARMY.

BERLIN, Germany, May 13.—Mutiny is rife in the Italian army, say despatches from neutral sources to the Overseas News Agency. According to that authority a regiment of the reserve, stationed in barracks at Pienza, rebelled yesterday against its officers. Other reports declare that a brigade from Sassari, engaged in active service on the Austrian front, also mutinied.

OVERDUE SEIKO MARU GIVEN UP AS LOST

[Associated Press by Federal Wireles] BOISE, Idaho, May 13.—More than fifty-two days overdue at Vladivostok, the Japanese steamer Seiko Maru is given up as lost, by local shipping men. She carried a cargo for the Russian government estimated at \$500,000 in value.

TEMBLORS SHAKE UP IDAHO CITY; NO DAMAGE

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EX-MAYOR SCHMIDT HEADS MOVEMENT FOR RECALL OF ROLPH

ROANOKE OFFICER'S BODY SALVAGED FROM SEA

WIRELESS PLANT FOR NEW YORK POLICE

The plant will be equipped to operate over a radius of 500 miles. The stations will be connected with army and navy posts.

MORATORIUM FOR CHINA
