ARMY & NAVY INSPECTION OF SIGNAL COMPANY THURSDAY NIGHT

Every member of Field Company A, Signal Corps, National Guard of Hawaii, is urged to be present Thursday night at 7:30 in the armory for inspection and a company smoker.

At last night's meeting of the company the men were put through drills and maneuvers in preparation for inspection. Capt. R. L. Noggle, company commander, made a short talk, in which he said it is imperative that every member attend Thursday evening, both for inspection and the good time to follow it.

There are now a sufficient number of men signed up to make a full-fledged company, and in the near future it is planned to make a Saturday night and Sunday trip in company with a regular army signal company, to do signalling and give the men a chance to see some practical signal work, participating in sending and receiving messages.

Fort Shafter Notes

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence) FORT SHAFTER, May 16.—A circular came out yesterday from the post headquarters stating that with a view to an investigation of the sanitary conditions surrounding the premises of hucksters trading in the posts, especially those dealing in fruit and vegetables, all enlisted men not messing in organizations and all officers are directed to submit at once to the adjutant the names and addresses of all hucksters from whom they procure supplies. This precaution has been taken on account of the appearance of amoebic dysentery, which recently was detected at the fort.

Sgt. Julian R. Wright, Company I, 2nd Infantry, has been detailed on special duty as clerk in the adjutant's office and has been ordered to report to the adjutant for instruction.

First Lieut. Lloyd R. Friendendall, 2nd Infantry, was selected as one of the judges on Sunday at the competitive National Guard drill. The lieutenant took Capt. Paul B. Malone's place as Capt. Malone was on sick report.

Surgeon Allen E. Peck, U. S. navy, a passenger on the Thomas for Guam, was a visitor at the fort during the Thomas' stay in Honolulu as a guest of his brother, Capt. Robert H. Peck, 2nd Infantry. Surgeon Peck will take charge of the navy hospital at Guam on his arrival there.

Capt. and Mrs. Paul B. Malone and family are making plans to visit the Big Island on Saturday. While there they will visit all points of interest and after the week-end will return to the Fort.


