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PAVED ROADWAY TO VOLCANO IS PLAN OF HILO

Superintendent Public Works Tells of Ambitious Project on His Return

Supervisors of the county of Hawaii are planning now upon a distribution of funds to put a concrete road from Hilo to the volcano, according to authentic word which reached Superintendent of Public Works Charles H. Forbes on his trip to Hawaii. Forbes and members of the public utilities commission returned this morning on the Kilauea.

Forbes says work of this kind on the part of the Hilo board would not be surprising as they are making great strides and accomplishing much in road work.

"They are certainly putting their souls into their work," comments the superintendent, "from one part of the island to the other. One of the things I noticed especially in Hilo was the system of electric lights which they have installed in the country villages to light the streets. The people of the island appreciate this very much."

Forbes comments on the fact that the non-use of Kubaio wharf by many steamers is very noticeable. The steamship companies do not want to go there, he says, for reasons which they will not disclose.

Waialana swam is filling rapidly under the contractors, and pumping is going on all the time. Homestead road work is moving along fine with the one exception of Chin Chuck road, where there seems to be some dispute over ownership of land, he says.

The superintendent smiled at the question of what happened over the Waialea road question. "Nothing happened," he says, "the people over there simply want to build a \$30,000 road and they haven't the money available. The land commissioner will have only \$15,000 for the job."

For the public utilities work the commission investigated the Maui Telephone Company, the Lahaina Ice Company on Maui. In addition to this Forbes inspected homestead roads and wharves on the Valley Islands.

On Hawaii the Hawaii Telephone Company, the Kohala Telephone Company and the McDougal Electric Light plant at Kohala were investigated. These hearings all moved along in a satisfactory manner and decisions will be given out as soon as the transcript has been gone over, and the auditor of the commission renders his opinion.

Speaking of the volcano, Forbes says that the light of it could be seen plainly last night from Lahaina, the sky in the direction of Hawaii being lighted over a great area.

"The flow is going to cut down through the \$300,000 belt road," he says. "They judge that it will reach there some time today."

WILDER LOOSES ACCUSATIONS IN GOVERNOR FIGHT

Former Judge A. A. Wilder is carrying his fight against Governor Pinkham to Washington again, according to interviews he appears to have given San Francisco papers on arrival there on May 9.

The following from the San Francisco Call is typical of the articles:

"Judge A. A. Wilder, former supreme justice of Hawaii, arrived today on the liner Matsonia from Honolulu on his way to Washington, he said, to prefer charges against Governor Lucius E. Pinkham of Hawaii. Judge Wilder, who went to Washington in connection with this matter six months ago, said he would see Secretary of the Interior Lane and President Wilson.

"He accuses Pinkham of misappropriating funds and says grand jury action on similar charges has been halted for lack of funds.

"Last year a law was passed appropriating \$10,000 annually for the care of indigent foreigners. Wilder says Pinkham gave this, in part, to Filipino members of the National Guard, who were not indigent.

"He also declares Pinkham is dilatory, his lack of decision hampering business interests."

BOCKUS AND GIFFARD BACK FROM INSPECTION OF COAST PROPERTIES

Charles G. Bockus and Harold Giffard were returning passengers on the Matsonia today from business visits to California. Bockus spent some time in looking over Mineral Products properties and he and Giffard also went into Amador county to investigate some mining properties there in which they may become interested.

SCHOOL METHODS TO BE CHANGED BY JAPANESE

First Meeting of Central Board Reaches Determination on New Text Books

Members of the central board of the Japanese schools of the territory held the first meeting of the organization yesterday afternoon, at which time a plan was voted to change the system of teaching now in effect in the Japanese schools.

Many of the prominent Japanese educators are now compiling special text books for use in the Japanese schools, and in the future Japanese will only be taught as a language, as the committee believes that the children in the schools have been overworked by making an effort to secure an education in both English and Japanese.

Among the Japanese interested in planning for a new system are: R. Mashimo, principal of Makiki Japanese school; S. Mori, principal of the Japanese Central Institute; R. Tsunoda, former principal of the Japanese high school, and T. Onchi, principal of the Hengwanji Japanese school, directors of the board. Consul-general Moroi, Rev. Y. Imamura, bishop of the Hengwanji Mission; Rev. T. Okamura, pastor of Makiki Christian church, and Rev. E. Ito, head of the Kakaako Japanese Girls' school.
