WITH TEMPORARY QUARTERS BANK OF CHINESE OPENS

Business is Taken Up and Fine Banking Home to Be Ready in July

Chinese of Honolulu are now depositing funds in the new Chinese-American Bank, which has opened temporary quarters in the store of Sing Chong & Co., at 1017 Maunakea street. These temporary quarters will be used until the latter part of July when the offices will be removed to the up-to-date banking rooms in the Hooking building at Nuuanu and King streets. The new building has been fitted up along attractive lines, and the office fittings will be of steel manufacture with mahogany finish. Included in the rooms are a writing room and a ladies' waiting room. A handsome vault is now in the course of construction.

Tong Phong, president of the bank, was for years connected with Sing Chong & Co., rice merchants, and is well known in New York business circles where he spent several years. Ching Lum, the vice-president, was the organizer of the Oahu Lumber Company and is well known in Honolulu. C. K. Ai, who will be cashier, is one of the most prominent Chinese in the city, having a wide acquaintance among businessmen of all nationalities.

Charles A. Wong, assistant cashier, who will be the new manager, is a Punahou graduate, and also completed a course at Harvard. He was at one time connected with the Spreckels interests. Lau Tang, secretary, is one of the best known young men in the city and is at present connected with Mackfield & Company. Ching Shai, assistant secretary, is manager of the Oahu Rice Mill and one of the stockholders of the China Mail Steamship Company.

The officers have announced that they will do a general banking business including loans and foreign exchange, and will conduct a savings department. They will solicit business from all nationalities. Their correspondents at present are the Canton Bank in San Francisco and the Bank of Canton in Canton, China. The business to date has exceeded the expectations of the officers.

CITY AFFAIRS AND SUPERVISOR NOTES

Next meeting will be Friday night.

The College Club has been granted permission to use Kaimulani school for the summer months.

The garbage department reports \$1831.00 receipts and \$2052.49 disbursements for April.

Central Grammar school addition has been christened "Keelkolani school" by the board.

It cost the city \$1048 to maintain its small parks during April, according to the report of A. K. Vierra, superintendent of parks.

Bench walk grades were set. Thus one more step in the improvements to be made in the district was taken. The call for bids on the work will be next.

Minor errors in curbing assessments in the Manoa improvement district have been called to the attention of the board and referred to the road committee for adjustment.

The city's share of the Manoa and Lusitana improvement assessments was voted on first reading Tuesday night. Manoa will cost the city \$30,651.50, and Lusitana \$12,118.52.

Dr. J. T. Wayson's letter asking that the board inspect the premises known as the Farm Corna Dairy, which belongs to Farm Corna's brother, was referred to the health committee.

The city treasurer, D. L. Conkling, reports that the receipts of the city for April were \$31,167.47 and the disbursements \$31,529.35. On May 1 the outstanding registered warrants amounted to \$27,564.38.

A claim of the Phoenix Assurance Company for \$47.55, paid to Maj. Wm. S. Gutzard for damages to his automobile resulting from a collision with the city ambulance April 6 at Nuuanu and King streets has been referred to the police committee.

The city engineer has been authorized to allow F. E. Haley \$50 a month until January for the upkeep of the Pupukea road. Haley is a pineapple planter and is willing to spend money of his own to keep the road he uses in shape, it was explained, but feels that the city and county should contribute.

Supervisor Hollinger, chairman of the parks and playgrounds committee, says that the playground equipment installed at Kamamalu park had been used so enthusiastically that he was planning to call on the board to vote another \$500 for equipment to be installed in another part of the city soon.

A proposal to exchange about six acres of land in Kaimuki, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, suitable for park purposes for a fishpond on Molo-

kaui has been presented to the board by A. F. Cooke, who owns the Kaimuki land and said he was willing to make the exchange and the club was anxious to see the deal go through. The park committee has been instructed to take the matter up with the land commissioner.

A bill for \$1064 for plans and specifications for the Central Grammar School addition, submitted by J. H. Craig, architect, has been referred to the parks committee. There has been a little tangle over this bill as although Henry Freitas, building inspector, was instructed to have the plans and specifications prepared, he was not allowed money to pay for them. Consequently when the bill came to the auditor with no order from the purchasing agent, he sent it to the board.

Pauoa park is declared not a park and Ben Hollinger, chairman of the parks committee, is instructed to so notify the Bishop Estate. The estate has asked that the park be cleaned up in pursuance of an agreement made with the territory in 1904 whereby the territory was to keep the land in good condition in return for its use. Jurisdiction over the parks has since been turned over to the city. Hollinger says that last year the estate offered to sell the land comprising Pauoa park to the city and that the city turned the offer down and since then has had nothing to do with the park.

There was considerable discussion Tuesday night over the award of concessions for Kamehameha day celebration in Kapiolani park. Supervisor Hollinger spoke of the difficulty of controlling the concessionaires and wanted to award each concession to the highest bidder. Supervisor Hatch was against allowing them in the park at all, saying that they should apply to the polo association and sell their sandwiches, poi, ice cream, soda water, etc., in the polo grounds and not commercialize the city's parks. Finally the park committee was directed to grant concessions to everyone it pleased and to set apart a space in the park to which they are to be confined.
