CANDY MAN IN LAST STAGE OF TUBERCULOSIS

Racked by the last stages of tuberculosis, a Japanese candy-cart man near the wharf has been mixing milkshakes and dishing up ice cream cones for the children and grown-ups that buy such wares. The Japanese has evidently been in a serious condition for several months.

Health officials who sent him to Leahi home yesterday, shortly after a diagnosis of his trouble showed that he had tuberculosis, say that the case is far advanced.

One of the health inspectors discovered the candy vender on Wednesday, and following his report an investigation was ordered at once. When the health authorities went down to his cart yesterday they found no one in charge of it. Search located the candy vender back of the brewery building, where he was lying in a state of collapse. He was taken at once to Leahi home.

The candy cart was taken over by the anti-tuberculosis bureau, and after a thorough renovating will be given back to the rick man's family.

VIGILANCE COMMITTEE TO GUARD KAIULANI PARK

Kaiulani park will be protected from the depredations of hoodlums after this. A vigilance committee has been appointed by the Kaiulani Improvement Club, and will watch the park nightly to see that bushes, fences and benches are not injured, as there have been instances of damage in the past.

SAYS CHRISTIAN SCIENCE WRONG

"We often hear the opinion expressed of Christian Science that it is neither Christian nor scientific." With these words the speaker of the evening, Evangelist McCord of the "Peace Palace," delivered one of the most convincing lectures yet given in the series of meetings which have been held in the city. Continuing his remarks, he said in part:

"If the above characterization is true the Bible will support it. While we have no desire to attack individual Scientists, we feel that we owe a duty to the community to investigate the teachings of this popular 'ism.'"

"Miss Mary Baker G. Eddy's book, 'Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures,' is the recognized text book of Christian Science, and from its title we would gather that it claims to be the key which will open the Bible lock. Christ's atonement is one of the recognized fundamentals of Christianity. See Rom., 5:10, 11. But in turning to the latest edition of this Christian Science text book we read: 'One sacrifice, however great, is insufficient to pay the debt of sin. The atonement requires constant self-improvement on the sinner's part. That God's wrath should be vented on His beloved Son, is divinely unnatural. Such a theory is man-made.' Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, p. 23, par. 1-3.

"If one fact is verified in the Scriptures above another it is that Jesus died. See 1st Cor. 15:3. Yet this self-assumed key to the Scriptures declares that Jesus did not die. Quoting the exact words, we read: 'Jesus' students not sufficiently advanced fully to understand their Master's triumph, did not perform any wonderful works until they saw Him after His crucifixion and learned that He had not died. This convinced them of the truthfulness of all that He had taught.' Id. pp. 45, 46.

"These are a few of the many contradictions in this so-called key to the Scriptures, and any one of them is enough to condemn the teachings of Christian Science, and proves conclusively that it is neither Christian nor scientific."

BLOCK SYSTEM TENDS TO CONSERVE SAFETY

Work has been started on the installation of a block signal system by the Oahu Railway & Land Company and will be completed in four months. It was announced yesterday afternoon.

Fifty-one semaphores are to be erected between Honolulu and Wahiawa, a distance of 22 2/10 miles. They are being furnished by the General Railway Signal Company of Rochester, N. Y. Four men have been sent here by the company to superintend the construction work. The total cost will be between \$50,000 and \$60,000.
