GUARD TO MAN

BIG GUNS SOON

One more afternoon of infantry practice in the armory, then down to the big gun battery at Fort De Russy.

This was the gist of an order given to the men of the 1st Company, U. S. C., National Guard of Hawaii, by Capt. George K. Larrison yesterday afternoon, at the suggestion of Maj. Joseph B. Douglas of De Russy.

"We desire to get you started right into the work for which you are in this company," Maj. Douglas told the 74 men who lined up before him for formal inspection, "and therefore we aren't going to keep you very long at work up here."

All of the company members have been invited down to the fort to watch the regulars at work with the guns and plotting board, the invitation being for any time the militiamen are able to get there.

According to Maj. Douglas' report the showing made by the men at inspection—and their possibilities for work in the guard are both excellent.
