HAWAII IS FOR PREPAREDNESS, WILDER STATES

Former Judge Says Islands Believe in Preparing for "Yellow Peril"

En route from San Francisco east, Judge A. A. Wilder stopped in Denver, was met by a reporter for the Denver Post and gave the following interview relative to Hawaii conditions: "We of Hawaii are for preparedness; you may be sure of that. We feel the closeness of what has come to be called the Yellow Peril, and we feel also that, sooner or later, with the rest of the United States, we will be compelled to take action against the aggressions and spread of that Yellow Peril. But many of us believe that Woodrow Wilson has made good as president and that he will do more than he has already done if given another term."

That is the political opinion of A. A. Wilder, former justice of the supreme court of Hawaii, and now a practicing attorney in Honolulu who stopped in Denver for a day on his way to Washington, after which he will go to St. Louis as one of six delegates from Hawaii to the Democratic gathering which will renominate Woodrow Wilson.

"Conditions in Hawaii are prosperous," said Mr. Wilder, "due wholly to the advance in the price of sugar, the principal product of the islands. At present the tariff cuts little figure with that product. It is the European war which has increased the demand and cut the supply, and under present quotations we would be prosperous if there were no tariff."

"We have a Japanese population in Hawaii of 99,000. The number is constantly increasing in spite of a 'gentleman's agreement' between the United States and Japan to limit immigration from the latter country. Few new Japanese get in, it is true, but last year there were 15,000 births among the 90,000 already there."

"Japan is overpopulated. She is looking for places into which she may spread. Her people will not go to Manchuria or Korea, where living conditions are no better than at home. They are seeking a 'white man's country.' They think they see it in the Philippine and Hawaiian islands, and this makes for the Yellow Peril. No Harm to Be Ready for War, He Declares."

"It has not yet been necessary for this country to pass drastic laws against the immigration of the yellow man, but if that day should come Japan would have to take cognizance of it. The thing might mean war, and preparedness should be seen to long before any hostilities can occur."

Although no definite announcement has been made, Judge Morrow may hear several cases in the local U. S. court prior to his departure.

RICE FORECASTS RECORD CROWDS KAMEHAMEHA DAY

Charles Rice, territorial senator from Kauai and retiring Republican national committeeman, prophesies the greatest crowd for the Kamehameha day celebration that Honolulu has ever seen on an occasion of the sort. He forecasts large attendances from both Kauai and Maui.

Charles Rice, who is now visiting in the city, says that Honoluluans "started something" when they undertook to give the Kamehameha Day celebration added publicity this year and to bring about a more general attendance from all parts of territory by offering special transportation and hotel rates for visitors and telling prospective visitors of the good things in store for them as has been done by the board of retail merchants.

"Kauai will send a 'great crowd,'" says Rice. "Already practically all of the accommodations on one steamer have been engaged and only a beginning made. We may send two shiploads. And on Maui it is the same way. A big crowd will leave there also. Yes, you will certainly have a record-breaking crowd at the celebration this year."
