Wilson to March For Preparedness

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—It is learned today that in the great preparedness parade to be held here June 14, President Wilson will lead the procession, march through the streets at the head of an immense line.

French Get Hold On German First-Line

BERLIN, Germany, June 1.—The French in hard fighting on the Verdun front have obtained a foothold in the German first-line trenches some 400 meters southeast of Dead Man's Hill. Repeatedly they attempted other assaults on various portions of the German line but were repulsed with extremely heavy losses.

Germans Repulsed

PARIS, France, June 1.—The Germans have been completely repulsed in the attacks they have made during the last 24 hours in the French positions on Dead Man's Hill. During the night they violently bombarded the French lines. Today there is intense artillery activity west of the fort Douaumont positions.

MORE ACTIVITY SEEN IN MARKET, SOME ADVANCES

VENEZUELA NOW! PEOPLE OPPOSE NEW PRESIDENT

Outbreak at Maracaibo When Successor to Aranguren Tries to Land

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—Twenty people were killed and wounded today in an outbreak at Maracaibo, Venezuela. The outbreak occurred when an attempt was made to prevent the landing from a steamer of Gen. Garcia, who has been appointed president to succeed the temporary president, Aranguren.

JAPANESE AVIATOR TO JOIN CHINESE REBELS

TOKIO, Japan, June 1.—Ozaka, Jr., son of the Japanese minister of justice, will leave Tokio today for Shanghai, where he will enlist with the revolutionary troops in the fight against Yuan Shih-Kai. Ozaka is an experienced aviator and has offered his services to Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who will confer with him upon his arrival at the China seaport.

FISHERMAN KILLED AT JAPANESE AIR TESTS

TOKIO, Japan, June 1.—The Japanese naval aviation corps held its graduation flight at Oihama base yesterday. During the flights one aeroplane drifted out over the bay and struck a sampan, killing one of the fishermen. The officer was uninjured.

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
