On Sunday afternoon the Filipinos, the heavy hitting team of the league will meet the Chinese in the opener. King Lacerna will pitch for the Filipinos, and Nelson Kan or Hook will take the mound for the Chinese aggregation. Both teams are fast on the paths, and with each having 500 per cent, the struggle will be interesting to watch.  
Bill Janssen will make another effort to win from the 25th Infantry at the closing number, and inasmuch as the colored soldiers lost their last game at Athletic Park, the Saints believe that they will win the men from Schofield. ## LOCAL GIRL TO MAKE TRIP FOR 100-YARD SWIM

One of Honolulu Feminine Stars Will Go to Frisco on July 4 for Championship Race

For the first time in the history of swimming a Honolulu girl will be sent to the mainland to compete against the leading stars. One of the fast feminine swimmers will go to San Francisco July 4, and a special race will decide the one who will be the choice. Whether or not one race will give a good line on the best swimmer is a question, and it would be much more satisfactory to all concerned if a thorough test was given should the trial contests be close.

Among those who are expected to enter the events are Lucile Legros, Helen Rosa, Bernicia Lane and others. In the past the girls' events have not attracted many entries and it is hoped that more entries will be booked for the coming competition. There are a number of fast swimmers in the city who have made the 50 yards under 35 who have not as yet entered the A. A. U. meets.  
**Meeting Today.**  
Plans for a special 100-yard race for Honolulu girls will be discussed at the meeting of the board of managers of the Hawaiian Association of the A. A. U. at the office of W. T. Rawlins this afternoon at 4 o'clock.  
One of the local feminine natators will be sent to San Francisco on July 4 to compete in the 100-yard national championship. In this race are entered all of the leading swimmers of America, including Olga Dorfner, Claire Galligan, Frances Cowells, Dorothy Becker and others.  
Arrangements will also be made for setting the date for the 100-yard national championship here and the question of who will come here to meet Duke, Keith, Lane, Kruger and others will be discussed. McGillivray is the logical man to be invited and Herbert Vollmer, the great furlong swimmer of Columbia University, is another swimmer who may be called here.

## PUNAHOU SWIMS FOR THURSTON MEDALS TODAY

Natators Will Start Competition in Pentathlon at 3:30 This Afternoon in Pool

OAHU COLLEGE, June 1.—The aquatic contest for the Lorin Thurston medals will be held in the Oahu College tank today and tomorrow at 3:30 o'clock.  
The contest is a pentathlon, the five events being: Fifty-yard swim, plunge for distance, 50-yard back stroke, 100-yard dash, diving, four required dives and two optional. The first three of the events will be held this afternoon, the last two tomorrow afternoon.  
There are two groups of swimmers among the boys and two groups among the girls. The girls' contests are held this week. The first group of swimmers is all those boys or girls who have competed in an inter-scholastic or A. A. U. meet. The second group is all those swimmers who have not competed in such meets previously. There will be medals awarded as follows: Properly inscribed silver and bronze medals for first and second place of boys "open" meet and properly inscribed medals, silver and second place for boys "open" meet and bronze medals for novice meets—in all eight handsome medals.

The swimmers have been working hard for the past month and a half. There will be about 25 boys competing and a large number of girls. The competitors are from the academy only, though the meet will doubtless become an annual affair and embrace the preparatory school next year.

Ty Cobb in Select Circle Ahead of Benny Kauff of Giants; Look at Burns Family

**CHICAGO, Ill., May 20.**—Jake Daubert, Brooklyn's first baseman, is leading the batters of the National League, according to averages published here today and including games played last Wednesday. His percentage is .384. Fred Williams, Chicago, though batting under .300, leads in home runs with six, is tied with Zimmerman, Chicago, in total bags at 60, and is tied with Groh, Cincinnati, in runs scored at 20. Carey, Pittsburgh, continues to lead the base stealers, having 13 to his credit. Boston has taken first place in club batting with .272. National League batters hitting .300 or better in at least half of the games are:

When Charley Weeghman, the champion feeder of the world, secured the Chicago Cubs after he had spent much of the money which was made by selling "coffee an", the fans in Chicago said, "Ho, ho, hee, hee," and then for good measure let loose a few more ho, hees. Joe Tinker of the Whales was named as manager. Brennan went to Toledo, and the crowd waited.

Mike Doolan will guard the short field position for Weeghman's pet this year, and the former Philie should make good there. Smith was let go, and Tinker decided that he was pau, so Mike will have a chance to prove that he is a real star. Doolan can't hit the size of his collar, but he can field in good fashion and is a heady ball player. As utility men Tinker will have Phelan, Beck and Robbie Zieder, the former coaster.  
**Feds in Garden.**  
Flack, who was the hitting star of the Whales last year, is certain of a place in the outfield, with Zwilling of the same team having an excellent chance to make good. Then Williams and Schulte of the Cubs, with Mann of the Feds will have an opportunity to fight it out for the third berth.  
Flack hit .315 last year, while Mann, the former Boston Brave, had an average of .308. Zwilling came home with a .291 figure, while Williams hit .257 last year and Schulte .249, which on paper would give the Feds a big lead, but the latter two players were forced to meet different pitching. Most critics believe that two of the Feds will be given the outfield berth, with Schulte as the next choice. Wilbur Good has departed to the Phillies.

As a team the Cubs should make a good race of it this year, but should hardly be given credit for being the best team in the league. On form they should finish in the first division, but with many of the teams strengthened this year it is hard to tell where they will land. They finish first in Chicago now, and the Midway critics may be right.

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
