**PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS TO SERVE
DURING 1916-17 PERIOD ARE NAMED**

Central Grammar Given 12 New
Instructors, Making It Sec-
ond Largest Institution

Henry W. Kinney, superintendent of public instruction, today gave to the Star-Bulletin for publication a partial list of the Oahu public school teachers recently appointed by the territorial school board to serve during the coming year. The list includes the appointments made in the largest schools of Honolulu and other parts of the islands.

Twelve new teachers have been added to Central Grammar school, making a total of 32 teachers. This makes Central Grammar the second largest school in the territory, Kalanani'one being the largest with 34 teachers. The new Central Grammar teachers were appointed to accommodate those pupils who will enter the new addition to the institution, which is expected to take care of Honolulu's school increase next school term, estimated between 500 and 600 pupils.

One noticeable change this year is the transfer of Mrs. F. W. Carter from the principalship of Central Grammar to the principalship of the Waiwahu school. Other than this very few changes have been made. Following is a partial list of appointments:

**HONOLULU WEATHER
DUNG MAY NORMAL**

Honolulu when during the month of May has been in every case very close to the normal. The total rainfall for this month was 1.94 inches, only .39 inch below the normal, which is 2.33. The normal temperature for May 75.0 and the mean temperature was 75.2 this month. The hottest day during May 26, when the temperature stood at 83.1 degrees, and the coolest at 61.1 degrees. The average humidity was 64.8 per cent. Humidity reached its highest point on May 25, when the reading was 87 degrees, and its lowest May 7 with 54 degrees. The lowest barometer reading was on May 25 and 26, when it was 29.98 inches, and the highest May 6th 30.19 inches. During May there were 7 clear days, 5 cloudy, 19 part cloudy, and on 19 days it rained more than .01 of an inch.
