### FIVE WORLD'S CHAMPIONS WILL COME HERE FOR SWIMMING MEET

Nation's Best Talent Will Compete in Great Night Carnival on Harbor on July 27, 28, 29—Perry McGillivray, Herbert Vollmer, Ted Cann, Ludy Langer, George Cunha, Duke Kahanamoku and Kelii to Meet in Honolulu Next Month

Five world's champions will come to Honolulu for the most prestigious swimming carnival ever held in Hawaii next month. When Duke Kahanamoku was sent to the mainland for a trial in the championships and Hawaii was awarded the 100-yard national championship, swimming enthusiasts expected that a star swimmer would be sent here to compete against Duke.

Instead the A. A. U. has arranged to send five stars, who will compete at the naval slip on July 27, 28 and 29. This will be the greatest outdoor meet ever attempted by the local association and will bring the champions here for competition with our local athletes.

The swimmers who will come here are Perry McGillivray, 100-yard national champion, who defeated Duke in the 100-yard event in Pittsburg and who is looked upon as one of the greatest swimmers in America. Duke later defeated McGillivray in a special race by a narrow margin.

Herbert Vollmer, the sensational swimmer of Columbia University, who won the 250-yard championship in New York, will also come. Vollmer has been the sensation in Eastern meets, and such authorities as Otto Wable and Harry Hubner predict that he will set new marks before he casts aside his swimming uniform.

Ted Cann, 500-yard champion, who defeated Duke Kahanamoku at St. Louis, will come here with the other swimmers. Cann is now in college, but will arrive here in time for the big meeting. He holds a number of junior records, having annexed the 100-yard title last year.

Ludy Langer, who won and lost to Duke Kahanamoku in February, will also compete in the various events here. Langer made a good impression here in his events and set a new record in the half-mile event during the Carnival. He was defeated by Duke in the 440-yard event in record time.

George Cunha will also be on hand for the big meeting and local fans believe that he will be able to hold up his honors with the other stars. In his races at the Olympic Club in San Francisco he has defeated the best swimmers, including Norman Ross, who was picked as a coming champion.

Cunha will represent the Heian Club here. In addition the Heianians will have Walker Grace, who arrived from the mainland recently and is expected to make a good showing.

In addition to Duke, Honolulu will have a number of star swimmers who are expected to make a good showing against the mainlanders. Included in this list are John Kelii, "Stubby" Kruger and Clarence Lane. Ah Yin Yee, George Hawkins, Kealoha and others will enter.

Kelii is one of the sensations of the year. Entering his first meet last month, he startled the swimming devotees with his form and speed and it was freely predicted that he is a real star who will have something to say about the title in the future. Before the meet he had been gathering fitness from the deep in the harbor.

"Stubby" Kruger and Clarence Lane are good pals and both are star swimmers. Kruger made remarkable time in a special meet at the Y. M. C. A. in the furlong swim and Lane flashed through the water in fast time in the 50-yard event. With these two stars to help Duke in the sprints, and Kelii to stir things up in the middle distances, Hawaii should make a good showing against the invaders.

W. T. Rawlins, Lorrin Andrews, Capt. A. J. Booth, A. T. Longley and John Soper were appointed a committee of arrangements at the meeting held yesterday afternoon in Mr. Rawlins' office, at which time the big swimming meet was announced. They will arrange all details concerning entries and the handling of the meet.

Featuring the first night meet ever held indoors in Hawaii, the committee is now at work arranging final plans for lighting the harbor. A string of lights will be erected on both sides of the slip and a series of swimming spaces which will enable spectators to see every movement as the race. The band will be out each evening to play between events.

The committee plans to stage the 100-yard championship on one evening, the 250-yard championship on the second evening and the 500-yard event the last night of the swimming carnival. This will give a big feature for each night and in addition there will be a number of other races on the program, including girls' events. The meet will start each evening at 8:15.

### GET READY CLUB ALWAYS IN LEAD AMONG ATHLETES

Organization of Y. M. Makes Good Showing in All of Associations Activities

If one should travel over the mainland and study into the young men's clubs of the Y. M. C. A., he would find few that had as splendid a record of a year's achievement as have the Get Ready club of our own association. It was organized about a year ago, with W. H. Pannett, who now is in the trenches with the British, and had at that time but three members. At the present time it boasts of fifteen members with an average attendance of thirteen at its Saturday evening club meetings.

The club has been active in all phases of "man making" projects. Early in the fall they began their athletic career by playing basketball. They seemed to have the tenacity of a bulldog as they would not play the part of quitters, although they suffered defeat after defeat at the opening of the season. However, they were to be rewarded for their consistency, as they stood next to the El Globo team in the championship of the basket-ball series and came within a small margin of even defeating them in the last game.

Not being satisfied with this honor they went into the inter-club debate. In this the club was represented by Fred De Witt Clinton and Paul Keppeler. In this they had to meet the representatives of the other four clubs and came out in the end with flying colors, having defeated each of the other clubs in succession.

It is to be a meet for members of the club only. A beautiful cup put up by one of the members of the club is to be presented to the individual who wins the greatest number of points in the meet. Seven events have been selected in which every member of the club is to participate in. The events are as follows: 60 yard potato race. Fence vault. Broad jump. 220 yard dash. High jump. 50 yard dash. 100 yard dash.

### MAUI POLOISTS EXPECT TO BE WINNERS HERE

Unusually Strong Team Will Represent Third Infantry, N. G. H., Against Army

Honolulu will witness the first polo match of the year at the new Kapiolani park polo field on Saturday afternoon, June 10, when the 3rd Infantry, N. G. H., team meets the Army team of Oahu. This match will dedicate the new field, which is considered to be one of the best in America.

Much interest has been stirred up in polo circles since the announcement was made that the Maui poloists would come here for a match with the local team. The Maui team that will come here has been practicing for some time, and in the recent matches with the Oahu team won two practice matches.

National Guard Four. Maj. F. F. Baldwin will captain the National Guard team, and Capt. A. W. Collins, Capt. Harold Rice and S. A. Baldwin will complete the team. An unusually large crowd is expected from Maui, and with the announcement that a match will be staged on Saturday there is expected to be a big exodus from the Valley Island.

Oahu will have a strong army team entered for the coming match, including four of the best polo players that have ever represented the Army since the institution of the sport here. Lieut. Charles M. Haverkamp of the 4th Cavalry, Lieut. L. A. Beard, 1st Field Artillery, Lieut. John K. Herr, 4th Cavalry and Lieut. R. E. Hoyle of the 1st Field Artillery will make up the Army team.

The practice games have given a line on the players, and this organization should rank well up with any on Oahu.
