Kim Luke's Aggregation Leads Schofield Team By 25 Points—Johnson, Ah Lee, Rogan and En Sue Top List of Hitters—Kan Yen, Nye and Crafton in Charmed Circle—Carroll Leads Honolulu Batters—Stars Fall Down in Stick Work

All this talk about the Wrecking Crew of the 25th Infantry has had a bad effect on the Chinese team, and they have proceeded to hammer the ball hard in the Oahu League games. Here it is: The Chinese team have a better collection of hitters than the 25th Infantry. Believe it or not, the figures prove it.

In 192 times at the bat the Chinese have slammed out just four dozen hits, two more than the 25th Infantry were able to make in 204 chances with the stick. 25th Infantry has the honor of leading in extra base hits, stolen bases and sacrifice hits.

St. Louis is third in hitting with the Honolulu in the cellar position. In the work of the bats the Lulus exceeded the St. Louis team, having purloned 13 haseocks, one less than the Chinese. In this department Rogan and Crafton lead with Souza, En Sue and Kan Yen next in line.

Johnson of the 25th Infantry is the real leader of the league in hitting, with eight hits out of 19 times up.

although Costa of the Honolulu secured two bingles in four times at bat. Ah Lee of the Chinese team has been doing good work with the stick, and tops Rogan and En Sue, who are tied for third place. En Sue has made a big hit with the bludgeon of late, and few will be surprised to see him up among the leaders. Ah Lee has also been hitting them "on the nose" as well as Kan Yen, who is well over 200. Others who are in the charmed circle are Nye of St. Louis and Crafton of the 25th Infantry.

Carroll Up On Lulus.

Johnny Carroll, who has been a busy man at the track the past few days, leads the Honolulu batters, with Ornelias next in line. Among the batters who have fallen down in the recent series are Moriyma, Swinton, Hawkins, Nishi, Perry and Albert Akana. Rogan, Nye and Crafton top the sluggers with two homers each.

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ARMY & NAVY OAHU OFFICERS WILL BEGIN ON EXAMS AT ONCE

Orders From Washington to Gen. Evans Name Men to Take Them

Instructions to begin examinations of local officers as soon as possible to determine their promotions in line with the new army bill, which was signed by the president on Saturday, were received this morning from the war department by Brig. Gen. Robert K. Evans, commanding the Hawaiian department.

Copies of the order have been forwarded to all the military posts on Oahu, and follow, in general, the instructions of April 26 relative to promotion of officers, which were printed in the Star-Bulletin at that time.

This morning's cable reads as follows:

"Evans, Honolulu.

"Under instructions sent to you April 26 examine officers entitled as follows, including all your command and all serving in the geographical limits of your department:

"Cavalry captains to include Capt. William B. Valentine, 10th Cavalry; 1st Lieutenants to include Henry W. Baird, 9th Cavalry; all 2nd Lieutenants.

"Field Artillery captains to include Capt. George M. Brooke, Field Artillery; all 1st Lieutenants and 2nd Lieutenants.

"Coast Artillery Corps, 1st Lieutenants to include William C. Whitaker, C. A. C.; all 2nd Lieutenants.

"Infantry captains to include Dorey Halstead, 4th Infantry; 1st Lieutenants to include Edgar L. Field, 25th Infantry; all 2nd Lieutenants.

"Examine officers entitled to promotion before leaving Hawaii, if scheduled to sail on transport leaving Manila June 15."

MILITARY CAMP FINE IDEA, SAYS GEN. R. K. EVANS

Thinks Slopes of Mauna Loa Afford Splendid Place for Maneuvers

Brig. Gen. Robert K. Evans, who returned this morning from the Volcano, together with Adj. Gen. Samuel I. Johnson of the National Guard and officers of the army staff here, is enthusiastic over the prospects of a military camp on the slopes of Mauna Loa.

"Plans so far are only tentative," said Gen. Evans today, "but we did decide on a place which we believe will be suitable for a camp of this kind. The place chosen is about a mile from the Volcano House and toward the Crater Hotel.

"There is room there for all kinds of maneuvers, and for rifle practice. In fact, the question of room is one of the least, for there is room enough about there for any number of men the local army posts or the National Guard could send over."

Gen. Evans says that while the camp would be primarily for the men of the guard, it would also very likely be used by the soldiers of Oahu, the bracing climate affording a splendid tonic for men who have been for some time on the lower levels.

"It would be feasible to build a dining room and kitchens," says the general. "Rain is not uncommon around the Volcano district and formerly when soldiers have gone on encampments there, they have had to do a bit of weathering. It isn't especially nice to eat one's bacon with the rain dropping onto it, and the idea of the big dining hall would be to shelter the men from the storm."

Gen. Evans is also much impressed with the activity of Kilaeua. Yesterday just before they left the Volcano it began dropping, though they not see the big drop of some 200 feet in a few hours.

Prof. Jaggard says that the drop was one of the most phenomenal things that has ever been placed on the record of the Volcano, the general declares.

"During our stay there the lava was sputtering and spouting freely and showed every sign of activity. It is surely a grand sight."

The party, which left on Saturday for Hawaii, included Gen. and Mrs. Evans, Gen. and Mrs. Johnson, Maj. and Mrs. M. J. Lenihan, Capt. Charles G. Mettler and Lieut. Hornsby Evans, aide to Gen. Evans.

Gen. Johnson and the other officers are also strongly in favor of such a camp as the plan now under way would afford.
