G. O. P. CONFERENCE COMMITTEE MAY TRY TO REACH COMPROMISE

Republican Delegates Fill Every Seat of Hugo Coliseum— Scenes Orderly—Over in Progressive Gathering Demonstration For Roosevelt is Enormous

CHICAGO, Ill., June 7.—Delegate Henry J. Lyman of Hawaii had been placed on the committee on resolutions and permanent organization, and Delegate Kuhie on the committee on credentials and rules. The necessity of the two votes of the Hawaii delegation is sure.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 7.—With the demand for Col. Roosevelt sweeping the Progressive convention today, while the Republicans were in a unique unmarked by emotion, indications tonight are that the G. O. P. leaders will try to reach some compromise ground. It is expected that they will consider appointing a conference committee to talk with the Progressives in the hope of finding a plan of unity.

After a session of two and one-half hours the Republican convention adjourned this afternoon to meet at 11 o'clock tomorrow. Temporary Chairman Harding had spoken for more than an hour. His speech was punctuated with cheers, while his sallies against the Democrats provoked laughter. Such harmony built confidence among the delegates, who are evidently holding that a way will be found to secure Progressive support.

Republican Convention Quiet in Comparison to Previous Meetings

CHICAGO, Ill., June 7.—"We want Teddy" is the battle-cry of thousands in Chicago today, up to now the feature of the two big conventions which opened for the nomination of candidates for president and vice-president.

Peace negotiations which were in progress all yesterday and last night between leaders of the Republican and Progressive parties were lost sight of today and virtually abandoned after the early morning of the business of organizing the conventions occupied the leaders.

COLISEUM, Chicago, June 7.—Draped in the national colors and with the blaring of bands adding to the uproar of more than 15,000 people, the Coliseum is today the scene of the Republican national convention's first day.

The convention opened shortly before noon with 983 delegates. Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio, temporary chairman, then delivered his "keynote" address.

Robins Stirs Progressives to Cheers Which Last Many Minutes

AUDITORIUM, Chicago, June 7.—Victor M. Dock of Kansas called the Progressive national convention to order at 12:27 today and almost immediately a wild demonstration for Roosevelt began in the packed hall, delegates and spectators joining in the cheers.
