PUBLIC HEARING, JUNE 27, 1916.
PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT OF KING STREET EXTENSION, FROM McCULLY STREET TO AND INCLUDING THE STREET INTERSECTION OF KING STREET AND BERETANIA STREET, AT MOILLILI ROAD, IN HONOLULU, T. H.

TO THE OWNERS, LESSEES AND OCCUPANTS OF LANDS ABUTTING ON SAID PORTION OF KING STREET, PROPOSED TO BE ASSESSED FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF SAID STREET, AND TO ALL PERSONS INTERESTED GENERALLY:
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, in accordance with Resolutions Nos. 349, 383, 384, motion of February 3, 1916, and Resolution No. 524, propose to improve that portion of King Street from McCully Street to and including the street intersection of King Street and Beretania Street at Moillili Road, in the District of Honolulu aforesaid, upon a frontage basis.

FRONTAGE TO BE ASSESSED.
The frontage to be assessed consists of the mauka or northeasterly property line and the makai or southwesterly property line abutting upon said King Street Extension and upon the street intersection of King and Beretania Streets within the end limits aforesaid, as more particularly set forth in the Engineer's report, dated June 1, relating to said improvements and hereinafter referred to and incorporated by reference.

MAIN THOROUGHFARE: CONTRIBUTION TO COST BY CITY AND COUNTY.
Since by Resolution No. 349, as amended by 383, said portion of King Street was declared a main or general thoroughfare, the City and County of Honolulu propose to assume and pay out of General Revenue 33 1/3% of the cost of improvement.

CHARACTER OF IMPROVEMENT AND MATERIAL.
(a) The grading, surfacing and paving with bitulithic on a crushed rock base of King Street Extension.
(b) The curbing with lava rock of all uncurbed property and the moving and resetting of present curbing where necessary.
(c) The installation of storm drains of concrete where necessary.

ASSESSMENTS PROPOSED.
(1) The cost of the entire improvement, less the proportion to be borne by the City and County, and also less the cost of new curbing, shall be paid by general assessment at the maximum rates of \$3,326.93 per front foot against all land abutting upon said portion of said street, as described, both sides included. The total frontage (including 292.0 feet frontage opposite cross streets and City and County property) is 6140 feet.
(2) The cost of new curbing shall be paid by assessment at the maximum rate of \$0.45 per front foot against the abutting lands in front of which the same shall be laid, there being approximately 5890.0 feet.

ESTIMATE OF COST.
(1) The maximum estimate of the entire cost of the improvement, including Engineering and Incidentals, is maximum, \$33,233.50
(2) Total estimate of cost of new curbing, 2,650.50
(3) 33 1/3% of cost of Contribution of City and County to Main Thoroughfare, 10,194.30
(4) Maximum estimate of cost of the general improvement to be assessed on a frontage basis after deducting items specifically borne is, 20,388.70
(5) Total frontage subject to assessment for the general improvement, 6,140 ft.
(6) Maximum rate to be assessed per front foot for the general improvement, exclusive of cost of new curbs, \$3,326.93
(7) Total frontage subject to assessment for the construction of new curbing, 5,890 ft.
(8) Maximum rate to be assessed per front foot for the cost of new curbing when necessary, \$0.45

All of which appears in more detail in the Engineer's Report, hereinafter referred to and herein incorporated by reference.
FURTHER DETAILS.
The map and general plans, and other data so prepared by the Engineer, in his modified report dated June 1, 1916, and adopted by the Board, with respect to the proposed improvement (incorporated herein by reference), may be seen and examined by any person interested, at the office of the City and County Engineer and of the City and County Clerk at any time during business hours, prior to and including June 27, 1916. Resolutions Nos. 349, 383, 384 and 524 (incorporated herein by reference) are one file in the office of the City and County Clerk.

HEARING.
A PUBLIC HEARING respecting the proposed improvement will be held before the Board of Supervisors at their Assembly Hall in the City and County of Honolulu on Tuesday, June 27, 1916, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p. m. or as soon thereafter as those interested may be heard, at which time and place a full opportunity will be given to all persons interested, to present suggestions or objections to the proposed improvement or any part or detail thereof.

IN MY LAST "TALK" I commented somewhat upon the type of features that photograph best in motion pictures and the difficulty often experienced in correctly estimating values in this respect. Sometimes the girl that might be expected to show to great advantage on the screen, proves an utter impossibility as a photographic subject. That it should be so seems out of all reason and inexplicable, but must be accepted as one of the vagaries of the picture camera.

Neither can any definite judgment as to a person's motion picture possibilities be based on the kind of portrait he or she can secure from the "still" photograph. A "still" photograph is specially posed with lights and position carefully arranged for the occasion. If this alone is not enough the photographer can retouch the negative and if he is clever enough, bring out one feature strongly and subordinate another. The motion picture, however, must accept things pretty much as it finds them. There is but limited opportunity for special arrangements and poses, and none at all for retouching.

It is consequently with considerable hesitancy that I attempt any analysis of facial lines or features in connection with motion picture requisites. Anything I say must be tentatively and with reservations.

With this understood, I will venture the opinion that the eyes are the most important of a picture actress's features. In drama, where the voice is denied one, the eyes are the most nearly audible part of the face. I think that you will find them always the most eloquent. I have often heard it said that dumb animals—the horse or dog, for instance—talk with their eyes, and I have certainly found it true with my own pets. The only reason we have not taken this more into consideration in respect to people is because they have a tongue and consequently there is small need to pay attention to the eyes.

In a way I believe it took motion pictures to make us realize just how much one may express with the eyes. The screen emphasized the old adage that "The eyes are the lamp of the soul."

I will not attempt to say what kind of eyes in shape and size and color are the most desirable. As a general thing directors believe that dark ones photograph the best. Hazel eyes, too, prove excellent in this respect, as do any others where there is a decided contrast between the iris and the white. Such eyes always seem to be the most decisive and to enunciate the most plainly in "screen language." In any event it is the expressive rather than the merely pretty eye that pictures require. They must be readily responsive to every mood of the actress' role. They must interpret her part; in short they must talk.

BEAUTY CHATS

Drink Orange Juice
ONE OF the best ways to start off a day is to take a cool shower and drink a glass of orange juice. One tones the body outside, the other inside. The habit many women have, of not feeling wide awake or able to get up unless they have had a cup of strong coffee in bed, is the result of either laziness or extreme nervousness, and the resulting lack of proper sleep. If you are one of the large number of women who feel half dead until they have been braced by a cup of coffee, try this shower bath and orange juice plan for two weeks, and see if you won't feel as lively as ever and far less nervous than before.

Cut an orange in half, running against the grain of the fruit, and first rolling and bruising the orange to break up the cells inside. The fresher the fruit, the juicier the inside will be. Squeeze all the juice into a glass, using the regulation lemon squeezer to keep the seeds separate.

Take your shower first—at other times, I have explained how easily a shower can be attached to an ordinary tub. If you have not the convenience of running water, a large basin and a sponge will answer almost as well. Rub briskly with a rough towel, twisting and bending as much as possible, to help the blood circulate. Then drink your glass of orange juice while you are dressing. This takes only a few moments' extra time, and makes you feel fresh and fit from the moment you leave your bedroom. Try it, and see.
