In the first game Black, for A Company, was the star with the wilow, securing a double and two singles in four times up. Given the smooth working machine that was seen in the 1st infantry at the time that Sadler was in charge the 25th infantry would be a wonderful ball team instead of a great one. The fans know Sadler as a ball player and coach who is working hard all the time to win. They would welcome the popular 1st infantry man as the leader of the 25th organization.

Santa Clara is coming next week with a strong organization, and if Sadler could be induced to handle the team for that series the 25th club would not have to bow to the collegians in the least. It is known that the players on the team would welcome Sadler as a leader, and if the former 1st infantry officer could be induced to take charge of the team for at least this series there would be considerable difference in the play.

The company games at the 25th infantry have brought out many stars that show promise, and the fans of Honolulu take as much interest in the progress of the team as they do in any other organization.
