SCHOFIELD GOLF MEN WORK HARD

SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, June 15.
Schofield Barracks golfers are a very busy crowd these days, getting into form for the tournament which is to be played next month for the Wall-Dougherty trophy cup.

The tournament will be a handicap one, with handicaps ranging from the scratch of Lieut. Snow and J. L. B. Greig to plus 24 of the newer players at the game. The handicapping committee has done excellent work and it is doubtful if the same number of players were ever more fairly handicapped than the Schofield Barracks Golf Club. This was very clearly demonstrated in the recent tomestone tournament, when everybody played the course with bogy plus their handicap. Nobody played more than the 18 holes, two players finished by holing out at 18 with five others on the green. Two contestants were in the eighteenth fairway and seven "died" in the seventeenth hole.

Last year every member of the club was entered by the committee and only about 50 per cent of the entries played. This made a great number of "byes" and kept the contest from being as smooth as it might have been. This year only those members who are going to play will be entered in the tournament. With the actual play over two weeks off about 80 per cent of the members have signified their intention to play. The match will be a most interesting one and will be very closely contested.

A hard contest is looked for. Forsters from both of these firms will be out in force.

MEREDITH PICKS WINNERS OF BIG INTERCOLLEGIATE

Star-Bulletin Selections Win in Nearly Every Event; Nine Winners Selected

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Ted Meredith, the University of Pennsylvania track captain and star of the recent intercollegiate meet at Cambridge, evidently is a close student of the ability of his contemporaries and rivals in athletics. A few days before the meet Meredith ventured a forecast of the probable performances of the Stanford and University of California athletes. The results as compared to his forecasts are worthy of record.

Meredith predicted that Stanford would finish in second place and California fourth. The two universities tied for third place. He gave Stanford 29 points and California 18. They scored 22 points each.

Murray for First.
The Pennsylvanian picked Murray of Stanford to win in both hurdle events. He did. He conceded Capt. Preble of California second place in the high hurdles. Preble placed third. In each hurdle he placed Norton of Stanford third. Norton ran third and fourth.

The best he would accord to Wilson of Stanford in the mile was third place while the popular verdict accorded him a great chance of being return victor. Wilson finished in fourth place.

He conceded the hammer throw to Gildersleeve of California, who won it. In the broad jump he accorded second place to Maker of California and third place to Sisson of Stanford. They finished in fourth and third place respectively.

STAR-BULLETIN FORECAST.
In forecasting the intercollegiate meet the Star-Bulletin went farther than Meredith in picking the winners and place men. Inasmuch as Meredith did not choose the Pennsylvania captain to win in the half and one-mile runs, the Star-Bulletin scored two beats there, due of course to the modesty of the great middle distance runner.

In the Star-Bulletin issue of May 25 the writer selected a list of stars who were considered to have chances in the big intercollegiate meet at Harvard. The results of the meet showed that in 12 out of the 13 events the Star-Bulletin selections placed well up.

In the forecast Teschner, Van Winkle, Kauffman, Kirksey, Treadway and O'Brien were picked for the sprints. They finished Smith, Moore, Teschner, Van Winkle and Treadway in the 100, and Moore, Smith, Van Winkle, Treadway and Kauffman in the 220. Moore of Princeton was the only man to upset the dope in these events.

Meredith Picked.
In the 440 the selection was Meredith, Wilcox and Richardson. They finished Meredith, Riley, Crim, Wilcox and Richardson. In the half-mile the pick was Meredith, Bingham, Biddle, Taylor and Parker. They finished Meredith, Bingham, Scudder and Taylor. The mile selections were Windnagle, Overton, Irish Carroll, and Wilson. Irish did not enter, and they finished Windnagle, Carroll, Overton, Wilson and Brown.

The Star-Bulletin also picked the two winners in the hurdle events, the choice in the high event being Murray, Preble, Norton, Farwell and Grubb. They finished, Murray, Grubb, Preble, Norton and Farwell. In the low barrier the choice was Murray, Norton, Farwell, Preble and Watt. They finished Murray, Farwell, Norton, Brown and Savage.

In the field events the men were selected for the first places but not in order. Liversedge, Spear, Richards, Caghey and Braden finished in the shot put. These were the Star-Bulletin's selections with Cross and Braden possible point winners. In the Broad Jump the winner was again picked and Sisson, Maker and Hampton were picked for second, third and fourth. They finished third, fourth and fifth. The first two in the pole vault were selected. Foss and Newstetter. The Star-Bulletin pick in the high jump was Oler, Richards, Johnstone, Lachmund. They finished Oler, Maker, Richards, Johnstone and Clifford.

This was followed up with the statement that Stanford would finish third in the meet. Stanford tied for third place. This follows out the pick in the local meets when the three intercollegiate teams were given an even show to the relay, the winner landing the meet. The next big athletic meet of note will be held in Newark in September.
