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## SAN FRANCISCO UNION MEN THREATEN ONCE MORE; MAY QUIT TOMORROW

### Russia Claims Capture of 173,000 In Series of Great Battles on East Front

#### GREECE BITTERLY OBJECTS TO WHAT ALLIES ARE DOING

Declares Entente Powers Are Oppressing Her, Interfering With Trade

#### RUMOR AUSTRIAN ARMY IN BUKOWINA SMASHED

Conflicting Reports From East Front; Little But Bombardment at Verdun

PETROGRAD, Russia, June 21.—Russia's great offensive campaign in Volhynia and Galicia up to June 15 had captured 172,484 men, hundreds of guns and other ordnance and large stores of material.

The Germans made an attack in massed formations on the Russians at Stokked river, but were repulsed and put to flight.

LONDON, Eng., June 21.—The Star's Athens correspondent says that Premier Skoufoulis and his cabinet have resigned.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—The Greek minister will present to the state department and to the representatives of the Latin-American governments identical notes protesting against the Allies' interference in Greece's maritime trade and asserting that traditional principles of neutrality have been violated, and that Greece is unable to obtain an explanation.

LONDON, Eng., June 21.—Gen. Pflanz's army in Bukovina has been cut in two by the Russians, the story being confirmed by a despatch to the Evening Star from Petrograd.

#### MAY FORCE GREEK MINISTER TO QUIT

(Associated Press by Federal Wireles) ATHENS, Greece, June 21.—It is probable that changes in the Greek ministry will result from economic pressure by the Allies. The resignation of Premier Skoufoulis is expected in some quarters.

#### RUSSIANS LOSE AT STYR

(Associated Press by Federal Wireles) BRESLAU, Germany, June 21.—The Russian forces which had crossed the Styria river west of Kottka have been driven back by a counter attack. Northwest of Lutsk the Russians have resisted German advances.

#### GERMANS REPULSED

(Associated Press by Federal Wireles) PARIS, France, June 21.—German attacks today upon Hill 108 and at Berry au Bac were repulsed. Heavy bombardments are taking place on the Verdun line.

#### FAMOUS GERMAN AVIATOR DEAD?

(Associated Press by Federal Wireles) LONDON, Eng., June 21.—Lieut. Immelmann, the famous German aviator, is reported killed.

#### BIG INCREASE OF ARMY IN HAWAII

Message Received This Morning Brings to Headquarters Important News

Washington, D. C., June 20, 1916. Evans, Honolulu.

General orders will issue from this office announcing formation new organizations under new national defense act as follows: Seven new regiments of infantry, one in the Philippine Islands, one in Hawaii, one in Canal Zone and four in Southern Department; two new regiments cavalry in Southern Department; three new regiments field artillery, two light artillery in Southern Department and one heavy artillery in Hawaii; three regiments and one mounted company engineers, including existing organizations. Increase in Coast Artillery Corps to be announced later. Photostat copy that order mailed today will set forth in detail necessary instructions to form those organizations.

#### HAWAIIAN BORN, BUT GRABBED BY JAPANESE ARMY

Seiichi Moriwake of Mana, Kauai, Serves Term of Forced Duty

Seiichi Moriwake, Hawaiian-born but recently released from the Japanese army, has just been granted a birth certificate by the territory of Hawaii.

Moriwake, who is 26 years of age, is a native of Mana, Kauai, and speaks English fluently. According to the evidence produced by him when he applied to Secretary Wade Warren Thayer for a certificate of Hawaiian birth, he was "grabbed" by the Japanese army for two years' service during a visit there with his parents. This was two years ago, and Moriwake's service expired only recently.

He came to the secretary and applied for a certificate almost immediately after arriving here, and after he had shown the necessary evidence the paper was granted to him. Moriwake's work was with the infantry branch of the Japanese army.

#### CARRANZA IS BLAMING U. S. FOR TROUBLES

In Statements to European Powers, Issued Through Legations, He Says His Country is On Defensive

#### GEN. PERSHING "CALLS" GEN. TREVINO'S THREAT

Moves American Troops to East But No Sign of Attack Has Yet Developed

C., June 21.—Diplomatic and other official circles here today are stirred at the news that representatives of the allied European powers are understood to be bringing strong pressure to bear on Provisional President Carranza of Mexico to prevent a break with the United States.

They are taking the stand that Germany is seeking to foment the war and inflame the Mexicans with a view to preventing the United States from gathering the trade formerly controlled by Germany in Mexico, South and Central America.

#### Punahou History Graphically Told In Picturesque and Quaint Pageant

Central Event of 75th Anniversary Exercises Taking Place on Alexander Field This Afternoon—Symbolic Pantomime and Dances—Hundreds Take Part

Reenacting with striking reality the many interesting and historical episodes which have occurred since the founding of Oahu College in 1841 and up to the present time, a panoramic review of political, educational, religious and social conditions that have prevailed in Honolulu during the last 75 years is being staged on the campus of Punahou this afternoon—the crowning feature of the institution's celebration of its three-quarters of a century of existence.

The Pageant is to begin at 4 o'clock. At the time of the granting of the lands in Manoa to the trustees 75 years ago, Kamehameha III was the feudal lord and owner in fee of all the lands in the kingdom. But there were certain lands which had descended to Liliha which were given by her to the mission, with the result that Oahu College, in other years merely a "school for missionary children," today stands in the first rank of American educational institutions—a forceful medium which has contributed in no small measure to the successes attained by many of the leading men and women in the territory.
