ARMY & NAVY MORE EXAMS. FOR NAVAL MILITIA MEN ON TONIGHT

Arms Practise Monday Night in Preparation for Range Work Planned for Next August

Examinations of all members of the Naval Militia of Hawaii who have not yet passed in the subjects comprised under the head of "What Every Man Aboard Ship Should Know" and "What Every Ordinary Seaman Should Know," also "What Men in the Seaman's Branch Should Know," will be held this evening.

Tests will also be given tonight in the seamanship examination, subjects S-1 to S-8.

At 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon there will be a boat drill under oars, with the two new 30-foot naval cutters. Ensign W. H. Stroud will be in command of one cutter and Ensign W. T. Day of the other.

All examination papers will be marked Sunday morning by the board of Naval Militia officers, and all men rated according to the prescribed complement will be given acting appointments as petty officers. About 26 men will be given appointments to fill vacancies.

Monday evening all officers, petty officers and gunners' mates, also men desiring to perfect themselves in ordnance and other members desiring the same training are asked to meet at 7:30 at the army under arms for sight drill, sight setting exercises, loading, aiming, firing and other gallery practise, preliminary to going on the range for small arms training practise early in August.

Regular drill on Tuesday, July 4, will be omitted, as the day is the national holiday.

Monday the Naval Militia's cutters will be towed to Pearl Harbor by the U. S. naval tug Navajo, to be used the next day by the crews of the U. S. S. Alert and the Navajo in the cutter race at the regatta there July 1.

KAMEHAMEHA TROOPS INSPECTED AT FORT
Muster and inspection of the 68th, 75th, 91st, and 143rd Companies and the 13th Band, Coast Artillery Corps, was held at Fort Kamehameha today.

Col. Alfred M. Hunter inspected the companies, the troops assembling on the parade grounds at 7:45 this morning. A battalion review followed.

Inspection of the Hospital Corps detachment was made by Maj. P. C. Fauntleroy, Medical Corps, while the Quartermaster Corps inspection was made by Capt. Norris Stayton, C. A. C. The ordnance department was mustered and inspected by 1st Lieut. Thomas D. Sloan, C. A. C.

2ND. LIEUT. LYMAN IS NAMED AS A. D. C.
The appointment of 2nd Lieut. Charles B. Lyman, 2nd Infantry, Fort Shafter, as an additional aide-de-camp, was made today by Brig.-gen. R. K. Evans, commanding the Hawaiian department.

First Lieut. Hornsby Evans, 17th Infantry, aide-de-camp to his father, Gen. Evans, remains in the same position. The general is entitled to an extra aide and the amount of work necessary in his office makes the appointment desirable at this time.

CLERK IS RELIEVED; SUCCESSOR CIVILIAN
Minor changes among clerks of the Hawaiian Department are to be made. Corp. George L. Hyde, Company K, 1st Infantry librarian at headquarters, has been ordered relieved, and will be succeeded as librarian and detachment clerk by W. E. Redmon of the civilian staff. Effective tomorrow, Pvt. H. F. M. Nagel, Company I, 2nd Infantry, has been detailed for special duty at department headquarters.

DANCERS WILL FILL ARMORY ONCE AGAIN
Tomorrow night in the armory another of the enjoyable National Guard dances will be given with a seven-piece orchestra, Feterseis's, furnishing the music. Indications are that the attendance will be larger than at any dance given in the last month or more.

CAPT. METTLER WILL TEST NEW TRACTORS
Tests of field artillery tractors will be made next month by Capt. Charles G. Mettler, ordnance department, armament officer. Observations will also be taken by him of firings with field artillery and machine guns. Five visits will be made to Schofield Barracks by Capt. Mettler for this work.

TRACTORS WILL BE GIVEN HARD TRYOUTS MONDAY

Over rough ground, up hills, down arroyos and under conditions approximating closely those of actual warfare, the three big new 46-horsepower Holt tractors of the "caterpillar" type, brought here by the Purline to haul field artillery, will be tested thoroughly Monday morning at Schofield Barracks under the direction of Lieut.-col. John E. McNahan, 1st Field Artillery, and Capt. Charles G. Mettler, ordnance department, armament officer of the Hawaiian army district.

Preliminary instruction in assembling the tractors, caring for them and operating the trio will be given officers and enlisted men of the artillery by Mr. Ralston of the Holt Manufacturing Company's service department, who came over with the tractors. Tests will demonstrate the tractor's hill-climbing ability and their efficiency in pulling heavy artillery.

MAJ. GUIGNARD HAS PASSED EXAMINATION

Telegraphic advices received this morning by the Hawaiian Department from Schofield Barracks announce that examinations of commissioned officers there, for promotion, have been completed and that Maj. William S. Guignard, 1st Field Artillery, was the last officer to be examined and to pass successfully. The major will tomorrow become entitled to the rank of lieutenant-colonel.
