THEATRICAL OFFERINGS
'UNTO THOSE WHO SIN' FILLS BIJOU
FAMOUS STAR IS NOW AT EMPIRE

"Unto Those Who Sin" is the title of the feature at the Bijou theater which filled that house last night and the title gives a very good insight into the story of the film. Fritzi Brunette appears in the leading role—as the principal sinner might be a better term—and she is a new and clever actress, with strong leanings towards the "vampire" type.
 While the story carries a lesson that is worth while, it is far from being in the class of "sermon" films. It tells of a working girl in whom the lure of wealth becomes the besetting sin. From an office drudge she becomes the wife of a wealthy young man and later his widow. It is as the widow that her work of destruction commences. Gradually her insincerity is discovered by the man who worships her and in the end—well that is the fascinating portion of the play.
 Charlie Chaplin is once more on deck at the Bijou and his clever manipulation of a hose, a genuine fire hose, with plenty of subjects on whom to operate, is a scream. "A Cute Little Bear" is an animal picture that is worth while.

Edna Mason, the internationally famous star, will make her film debut in the two-act play of feminine ingenuity, "Vanity," a new offering at the Empire theater today. The story carries a number of amusing characterizations and strikingly original situations.
 In the role of Kitty, Miss Mason is said to have abundant opportunity for the display of her charming personality. A splendid supporting cast adds much to the success of the play. William Clifford and Arthur Shirley make an initial appearance in this production. "Vanity" borders along the line of a crook play of sterling merit.
 "Freaks" is a happy vehicle in which Max Asher, Gale Henry, William Franley and other equally famous comedians have important parts. Some clever acting and acrobatic work is shown in the faithful delineation of a mankin. A riot in a toy-shop brings out a host of laughable complications.
 Billy Reeves returns to the Empire today in the comedy, "The Lure of Money," and Charles Ogle is featured in the comedy, "The Memory Tree."

BATTLING GLANS
STRONG PICTURE

Dustin Farnum, one of America's favorite theatrical sons, both in the spoken and silent drama, leaves the Liberty theater at the close of the performance of this evening and with him goes one of the best Paramount features in which this sterling actor has appeared, "The Call of the Cumberlands." In this drama of feud and strife below the Mason and Dixon line there is a touch of pathos, considerable quaint humor and sufficient drama to satiate the most exacting.
