NEW FEDERAL TAX BILL TO HIT BIG INCOMES HEAVILY

Outline of Kitchin's Legislation Shows Democrats Need Huge Revenue for Government

MUNITIONS INDUSTRY TO HELP PAY EXPENSES

Administration's Tariff Road Idea Incorporated in Measure

Telegraphic despatches from Washington say that the revenue measures of the administration are to be put through ahead of virtually all other legislation, and that the Republicans, while opposing some features, will not carry on a "filibuster." The following Washington correspondence summarizes the proposed revenue legislation:

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—The general Democratic tax bill designed to raise revenues, fill the depleted treasury, and pay for preparedness, was presented to Congress today.

The bill, as introduced in the House by Majority Leader Claude Kitchin, chairman of the ways and means committee, is expected to raise \$250,000,000 of annual income for the government. Its provisions are:

- 1.—A revision of the present income tax, doubling the rate on all incomes from \$3000 up, and imposing an additional surtax on incomes above \$20,000. This provision is expected to add \$110,000,000 to the revenues.
- 2.—A tax on munitions of war, imposing a graduated excise on the gross receipts of manufacturers of gun powder and other explosives, ammunition and firearms, and smelters and refiners of copper. This tax is expected to raise \$50,000,000.
- 3.—A tax on inheritances above \$50,000, graduated from 1 per cent on the first \$50,000 to 5 per cent on any amount above \$450,000. This provision is expected to add \$50,000,000 to the federal income.
- 4.—A reenactment of a portion of the present war revenue act, confining taxes on "beers, wines and liquors, bankers and brokers, theaters, moving picture shows and other amusement places and manufacturers of tobacco." The stamp tax section of the war revenue act would be repealed by the new bill. This provision, it is estimated, will raise \$10,000,000.
- 5.—The administration provision creating a tariff commission of six members to "take the tariff out of politics."
- 6.—A provision imposing protective duties on products that would compete with the "infant dye" industry in this country. The president would be authorized to eliminate the duties at the end of five years if the infant industry is not producing 70 per cent of the domestic consumption of dyes.
- 7.—An anti-dumping law prohibiting the export of American manufacturers "under the actual market price" by foreign competitors and making such "unfair" competition "punishable as a misdemeanor."

KEEP MUNITIONS OUT OF MEXICO

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—Under authority of Counselor Poik of the state department, permission is given for the restoration to the normal of the movement into Mexico of all commodities except munitions of war.

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SUFFRAGE ISSUE ISN'T TAKEN UP BY REPUBLICANS

Territorial Platform Framers Fail to Follow National Action

PREPAREDNESS AND TAX INCREASE ARE INCLUDED

Many Subjects to Be Dealt With; Lively City Charter Discussion

Preparedness, the tariff and other national political subjects will figure in the Republican territorial platform to be adopted next week, but from present prospects woman suffrage will be left alone. It is regarded as containing elements of political danger.

Twenty-eight G. O. P. party leaders met late yesterday in the office of A. D. Cooper, chairman of the general committee in charge of arrangements for the territorial platform convention, and canvassed the proposed planks pretty thoroughly. On a number no decision was reached and various sub-committees and active workers are busy today on details which will be reported to the general committee perhaps tomorrow.

On Saturday at 1 o'clock there will be a general gathering of all convention delegates in Honolulu and other interested party men. It is a sort of caucus in advance of the convention, which meets Monday at 9 o'clock at the Bijou theater.

FIND OF BONES EXCITES PEOPLE ON WATERFRONT

Discovery Made in Excavation at Pier 12 Rouses Many Surmises

REMAINS ASSUMED TO BE THOSE OF GIANT

Theory is Offered That They Belonged to Nuanu Giant of Years Ago

About the waterfront there has been stir and excitement which spread even to scientific circles. The stir is the finding of bones that have been assumed to be those of a giant of olden days. Doubt has been cast upon their authenticity as human relics by scientific authorities who claim they are the bones of a whale but there still are those who insist the bones are those of some gigantic human being.

A representative of the Bishop Museum who saw the bones this morning believes they are those of a whale. "What was supposed to be part of the thigh bone of a giant man was found Wednesday afternoon in front of Pier 12 in the excavations at a depth of 13 feet. The bone, now measured 24 inches long but when it was part of a man it must have been 30 inches in length and at the big end it is 8 inches in diameter and at least 30 inches around.

CAMPAIN-HIT, COLONELS TO BE RETIRED SOON

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—It was announced at the war department today that five colonels now on duty at the Mexican border will be ordered before retirement boards, with a view to retirement because of physical disability, the result of the rigors of camp life in the southern climate, and hardships suffered in chasing the Mexican bandits. Four of the five are Col. James Lockett, 11th Cavalry; Jacob Galbraith, 3d Cavalry; William Brown, 10th Cavalry; and Charles Penrose, 24th Infantry.

'Phone Famine Exists Here; Is Due To Strike

Honolulu has a telephone famine. This unusual bit of news was learned today, when at the office of the Mutual Telephone Company it was stated the stevedores' strike in San Francisco has tied up shipments of new telephones to this city so that the company has entirely run out of its reserve supply.

Mutual Co. Cannot Fill Orders; Shipment Coming By Express to Relieve Situation

"We have orders for new installation of 60 or 70 phones here," said an official of the company this morning, "but we cannot put them in, because we are not able to get shipments from the coast, although the phones are on the dock at the other end." He added that no new telephones have been received from the mainland in almost six weeks.

Famous Diva, Known in Honolulu, is Now Red Cross Nurse on French Front



Mme. Emma Carve, the noted operatic prima donna, and who appeared some years ago in Honolulu, is now a Red Cross nurse with the French troops. Some time ago it was reported she was suffering from exposure while pursuing her charitable mission, but recently she returned to Paris for a rest, apparently in no danger. She is a Frenchwoman by birth.

UNREST IN SPAIN LEADS TO BIG RAILWAY STRIKE

So Serious is Situation Madrid is Declared in State of Siege

BERLIN, Germany, July 13.—The great Russian drive in the region northwest of Buczacz has been checked by the Germans and Austro-Hungarian allies under Gen. Count von Bothmer. In this district, which commands the approach to Lemberg, the Teutons have taken the offensive. Gen von Bothmer led his army in an encircling counter attack, so that the Russians, to avoid being cut off in an advanced position, were forced to fall back.

BIG RAILWAY STRIKE THREATENS SPAIN'S PEACE

PARIS, France, July 13.—Industrial and military unrest in Spain, which has been increasing during the last few months and is based largely on the war situation, has reached a serious crisis. A despatch from Madrid says that the capital city and province have been declared by the government in a state of siege, owing to the strike of railway employes and the drastic measures taken to compel the operation of trains.

DEUTSCHLAND FINISHES UNLOADING HER CARGO

BALTIMORE, Md., July 13.—Unloading of the German submarine Deutschland has been completed. As the cargo has been taken out, the vessel has been rising in the water, and today it could be ascertained that she has a length of 250 feet and a width of less than 25.

GERMAN OFFICIAL CABLEGRAMS

GERMAN HEADQUARTERS, July 12.—Combs on the afternoon of July 10 on both sides of roads of Bannau, Albert, Contalmaison, Mamelle woods, Fresnoy, and combats in Trones wood, and southwest continue with violent tenacity.

South of Somme the French in large forces attacked Belloy Soyecourt but suffered sensible defeat. The attack broke down completely in our fire, also smaller forces, engaged against Lamancheville Barieux, under heavy losses retired. Separate French attacks east and southeast of Rheims, northwest of Massages, northwest of Flierey.

West of Meuse, smaller combats. East of Meuse, German lines approached the works in Souville-Laufee, 20 officers and 2300 men prisoners. Strong counter attacks repulsed. Successful German patrols southwest of Dixmude, southwest of Gerney.

East of Pfladerhausen, British planes were forced to land within our lines at Ailettes. The enemy's aeroplanes shot down at Boyebour, another brought down by our anti-aircraft gun fire in Chateauguon. A Dornier enemy captive balloon was shot down.
