The tax is figured. The jobbers, of course, pass the amount of tax on to the consumer. The advantage of this scheme is that the autoist is taxed only on the amount of gasoline he uses, hence on the extent to which he uses the roads.

This scheme was favored during the legislative session of two years ago by the Honolulu Auto Club, it was stated today, but not put into shape for enactment.

DIPLOMAT SAYS BRITAIN FEELS MOST CONFIDENT

Delighted with every aspect of Honolulu, B. F. Alston of the British consular service, who is going to Peking to be charge d'affaires during the absence of Sir John Gordon, consul, arrived here this morning on the Shinyo Maru and is spending the day visiting about Honolulu.

"Your city is one of the most delightful places that I have ever visited," said Alston today. "I spent the morning at Waikiki and the aquarium. I never imagined that there were so many beautiful fish in the world, and the water is most delightful. I hope sometime to be able to spend several months here."

When asked concerning the situation in China with which country he is very familiar Alston said, "I believe that Li is a very good man for president. He is well liked in China and should soon bring conditions out of their present chaos." Alston is direct from London and said that everything there is progressing very satisfactorily. "The people are cheerful," he said, "and everyone believes in the ultimate success of the British arms."

RELIGION TODAY IS KEYNOTE OF ALL EDUCATION

Consul Moroi Tells Graduates Americans and Japanese Following Same Lines

The fifth commencement ceremony for the girls' high school department and sixth commencement for the boys' high school department of the Advanced Educational Home of Hongwanji Mission were held at the home's hall in Fort street last night. Thirty-two boys and 11 girls were graduated.

"As the graduates of this Advanced Educational Home, my young friends, you occupy a unique position among Japanese students. Many Japanese schools here are quite independent of the religious influence; they neither believe in any religion, nor hold it in reverence. But this kind of education, which disregards religious influences in school, is the education of the recent past of the Meiji era.

"As a matter of fact, American institutions are strong with religious flavor. Even in the public schools religion is looked up to as the indispensable factor of moral instruction. And I can venture to say that the main tendency of education throughout the world is religious, just as the education of the eighteenth century was intellectual and that of the nineteenth century moral.

"Seen from this new light, the aim of our educational homes and the spirit by which they are guided will never fail to be appreciated by both American and Japanese communities here. Of course, I am fully aware of the fact that by religion American schools mean Christianity and Japanese Buddhism. But in essence all true religions are the same; they are as brother to brother and sister to sister."

The city purchasing agent, H. E. Wescott, wants to find A. T. R. Jackson. ORDINANCE AS TO PURCHASING AGENT DEBATED

Important Measure is Considered by Supervisors, Passes Its First Reading

Amendments to the purchasing agent ordinance passed first reading at Thursday's meeting of the supervisors after a prolonged discussion as to send the audience out into the hallway to pace back and forth impatiently. Numerous disputes arose between members of the board as to the advisability of leaving out certain sections or words. Fully 15 minutes was taken up at the beginning of the consideration of the bill with argument as to whether supplies the purchasing agent buys are "furnished to" or "purchased for" the various departments.

Again, there were speeches by almost every member of the board on the need, or its lack, of a section providing that the purchasing agent should not be interfered with by other employees. Discussion of the proposed bond issue for roads, water and sewer extensions and parks was again postponed as a result of the time taken in consideration of the purchasing agent ordinance.

The changes in the ordinance are designed to allow department heads to buy materials and supplies on contract prices obtained by the purchasing agent, but without the necessity of going to him for orders.
