

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


GERMAN TROOPS THRUSTING BACK ENEMY ATTACKS

(Official cablegrams.) GERMAN HEADQUARTERS, July 21.—It was reported yesterday that an attack was made on Fromelles, being undertaken by two strong divisions. The gallant Bavarian division who repulsed the attack counted over 2,000 dead enemies in the fore field. Besides, up to now, 481 prisoners, among whom are 10 officers. Sixteen machine guns were taken.

On both sides of Somme yesterday, the expected great thrust took place, but failed. Numerous waves attacked on 40 kilometers front from Pozieres to west of Hermandovillers. Over 17 divisions were engaged. The scanty enemy's success is as follows: One German division south of Hardecourt on about three kilometers breadth pressed into the next line 800 meters backward and further, the enemy penetrated into salient and Hermandovillers. On the whole rest of the front, furious attacks broke down with extraordinary enemy losses. Undaunted by death, the loyalty of our troops was shown. British cavalry entered the combat but this new feature was unable to change definite results. Until now, 17 officers and 1200 men are prisoners.

On the rest of the front, artillery mine throwers are busy at south La base and northwest of Lens and Argonne and both sides of Meuse. North of Vondresse, a small French detachment after fruitless blasting, attempted an attack but was repulsed. The crater is occupied by us. Before our front south of Pozieres, an enemy's aeroplane was shot down. Another northeast of Bapaume has fallen into our hands.

Hindenburg's army. Southeast of Riga feeble enemy attack was frustrated. Russians attempted to cross Duena on both sides of Friedriehstadt, but failed. North of Oveten, a small detachment crossed the river. North east of Smorgon, advanced field guards were thrust back before our superior forces.

Linsingen's army. After having stopped Russian attacks, between Werben and Korsov, salient positions of Werben were taken back before the expected encircling attack took place.

Most wonderful legends are told by Anglo-French about German losses. Thus a wireless from Poldhu reports captured German diary shows one battalion of 119th regiment lost 980 out of 1100 while two other battalions, that regiment, lost over half of its effective strength. It is stated that of the mentioned regiments, total losses during the last weeks up to yesterday reached 500, just one-fourth of the British figures.

HAWAII'S FIRST STATION CRUISER IS ON WAY HERE

(Associated Press by Federal Wireless) SEATTLE, Wash., July 22.—The cruiser St. Louis sailed for Honolulu today.

"The St. Louis will be stationed permanently at Pearl Harbor as flagship of the commander of the 14th Naval District, of which the Hawaiian Naval Station is headquarters," said Rear-Admiral Clifford J. Boush, commandant at Pearl Harbor, when informed over the telephone today that the St. Louis sailed this morning for Pearl Harbor from Bremerton, Wash.

"We expect to moor the cruiser off Magazine Island, near the present base of the third submarine division," he added. "Our latest advice is that Lieut.-Comdr. Victor S. Houston is in command. We do not know whether she has a full or skeleton crew. She will have several duties to perform, accompanying the submarines and acting as a training ship for the Naval Militia of Hawaii, as well as being the flagship of the commander of this naval district."

The Navy Directory of June 1 shows the St. Louis is a first-class cruiser of 14 guns, 9700 tons, 21,000 horsepower, twin screws. Her officers are given as follows: Lieut.-Comdr. V. S. Houston, commanding; Lieut. R. S. Culp, Lieut. (j. g.) R. S. Parr, Surgeon W. S. Hoer, Paymaster G. Skipwith, Chief Boatswain W. A. Macdonald, Chief Gunner W. O. King, Chief Machinist D. Mullan, Pay Clerk C. B. Fuller.

roads or bridges will be repaired by the government; and the city will not be asked or expected to pay any of the government's hauling costs, as was stated by the supervisor.

4. The government has a right to a reasonable use of the roads of the territory. In this case if any hauling is done, the vehicles used and the loads carried will be such as to do the least possible damage to the roads. 5. The quartermaster's department spends about \$1,000,000 a month in Honolulu and this money is of direct benefit to the entire population. 6. The territorial officials have requested the national government to build a road around the entire island.
