### HAWAII FRIENDS DECEIVED LANE, GREGORY, CLAIM

For This Reason Were Not Open to Attack by Judge Stuart, Asserts Wilson

John H. Wilson, Democratic national committeeman, practically agrees with L. L. McCandless in the position the latter has taken with regard to Circuit Judge T. B. Stuart's "personal" letter to the president. As to the letter, McCandless said: "I might have said the same things to some extent, but in a different way." Wilson says: "The local party has already supported all his statements, but does not approve of the way he went about it." That Judge Stuart's letter to the president, in which the latter is criticized, and in which Secretary of the Interior Lane and Attorney-General Gregory are attacked, is "all right in a way but uncalled for," is Wilson's opinion of the communication, as expressed by him to the Star-Bulletin today. "Officials in Washington know what was going on in Hawaii," says Wilson. "Stuart has made similar statements to them before, but not in letter form."

He goes on to say that the party here, presumably meaning the McCandless-Wilson faction of the Bourbons, has already supported all of the statements made by Judge Stuart in his letter, but that "it does not approve of the way he went about it." "We were not consulted by Judge Stuart regarding the letter," he declares. "He felt that it was none of our business, I guess. It was his own idea, as far as I know." "His attack on Lane and Gregory is not approved, but outside of that he told the truth. We knew that both Lane and Gregory had been deceived, and the fact that Lane and Gregory were deceived by their friends should not warrant abuse from me or from any member of the party including Stuart."

"One can be fooled a lot easier by his friends than by his enemies, and I know as a matter of fact that Lane and Gregory were deceived by their friends." "Friends in Hawaii?" the interviewer asked. "I won't say," Wilson concluded, "but in one case it was by friends here in Hawaii."

### BOURBONS LINE UP CANDIDATES FOR ELECTIONS

Mention McCandless as Possibility for Delegateship and For Mayor of Honolulu

Pauahi street's political pot boiled over today, spilling the names of a number of candidates for the various departments of the city and county government may undergo changes so far as their respective heads are concerned.

So far as the November elections are concerned, L. L. McCandless appears to be the only Democratic possibility for the delegateship, unless the so-called Pinkham faction decides to enter someone in the race. Reports from Pauahi street are that McCandless will be the only Bourbon candidate. It was stated recently that Senator James L. Coke might run, but the McCandless backers say he will not be available for the reason that he has been mentioned as a likely successor to Circuit Judge T. B. Stuart.

Candidates for senators on the Democratic ticket are likely to be Prof. W. A. Bryan, Richard H. Trent, Curtis P. Lauka and Archie Robertson, say those in Pauahi street who profess to know.

Regarding candidates for the lower house of the legislature, J. M. Bright is the only man thus far mentioned, among the possibilities in the fourth district. Of the likely candidates in the fifth district, the names of the following are mentioned: Dan Kamahu, M. Baptist, David Kupihua, F. C. Benevides, William Miles, David Kalawala, David Kahaleaaha, Robert 'Ahuana, Gus Kaleohana, and "Sonny" Gay.

Pauahi street asserts that McCandless may also be a candidate for the mayorship, and that his opponent may be Joseph J. Ferns. McCandless was Joseph Lightfoot ran two years ago as candidate for city and county attorney on the Democratic ticket, and lost by a narrow margin, and it is now rumored that he may be put forward as a candidate in the next election. The name of Senator Coke also has been mentioned in this connection. It is readily admitted in Pauahi street that the Democratic candidate will have a hard fight on his hands, as his opponent undoubtedly will be Arthur M. Brown, the present city attorney. Charles H. Rose appears to be the only man in view as candidate for sheriff.

### KALAKAUA AVE. IMPROVEMENT TO COME UP TONIGHT

Supervisors May Finally Determine Action on Paving Project at Meeting

Kalaka'ua avenue improvements can be made despite the protests of two of the property owners in the assessed district, as they hold but 23 per cent of the frontage, says an opinion to be submitted by A. M. Cristy, acting city attorney, to the supervisors tonight. A letter addressed to the board by E. W. Sutton, attorney for the Territorial Hotel Company, offering to withdraw the protests if the board will assure his clients that there will be no further assessment for improvements during the ten year life of the bonds, will be read.

Several of the supervisors have signified their intention of fighting the proposal to grant the "assurance" on the grounds that it is unnecessary, as the law provides all the protection needed for the property owner. Discussion of the proposed bond issue for roads and extensions of the water and sewer systems will be a special order of business; a letter from the Mid-Pacific Carnival, Ltd., requesting permission to use Aala Park during the Carnival will be read; contracts for the erection of a five room addition to McKinley school and for street lighting for Beach Walk will be awarded and several resolutions and ordinances will come up for second and third readings.

### PARK SUPERINTENDENT MAKES ENDS MEET TO THE VERY LAST CENT

A. K. Vierra, superintendent of parks, is a real financier. He managed to make his disbursements come out exactly even with his "balance on hand June 1" last month, even though it involved the expenditure of an odd cent. It is quite a job to get rid of an odd cent in Honolulu, but Vierra managed it. The balance on hand June 1 of the park department appropriation was \$1062.01, according to his monthly report. On the same authority, July 1, it was \$0.00. It went as follows: Pay roll, \$697.50; labor, \$138; materials and supplies, \$196.51; total, \$1032.01. June bills for the department are not all in, so the city auditor could not tell where the odd cent went.

With the aid of 16 prisoners, not on the payroll, Aala Park, Thomas Square and the McKinley High school grounds were "mowed and cleaned," basket-ball frames at Atkinson Park were rewired and a log swing that will accommodate 25 children at once installed at the same place.

### REPORTED DROWNING AT WAIKIKI HAS NO VERIFICATION HERE

Rumors that a man had been drowned while diving from the diving platform at the Outrigger Canoe Club Sunday seem to have no foundation as inquiry from all possible sources has failed to throw any light on the situation. No report of any drowning accident at Waikiki has been filed with the sheriff or police for nearly a month. The rumor apparently started two weeks ago with two women who said a man had dived from the platform and they believed he had not come up. Others exaggerated the statement until the report was that the diver had been drowned. A soldier's body was found on the beach several months ago but no drownings have been reported there since then. J. A. Beavens, secretary of the club, said today he was swimming at the Outrigger Sunday afternoon until 6:15 p. m., and that there was no accident occurring or rumored while he was there. Treasurer L. C. Thompson said he has had no report, but had heard a vague rumor two weeks ago which he did not believe true.
