Jay Gould Proves to Be Star Polo Player

Court Tennis Champion Startles Spectators With His Great Work With the Mallet—James Spalding Plays in Old Time Form in Practise Match—Visitors Win From Oahu Team in Eight Periods—Next Practise on Saturday Afternoon

Some are talking polo and others speak of racing. Although it is more than one month until the polo and racing features begin in earnest many of the Honolulu fans are planning on the races and matches to come. Each day one may see poloists out at Kapiolani Park taking the green points through the work in practice.

A few devotees of the great game of polo had the pleasure of witnessing an excellent practise match on Wednesday afternoon at Kapiolani Park. In addition to the game they had the pleasure of witnessing a star in action. This was Jay Gould, world's champion court tennis player.

It is not commonly known that at one time Jay Gould was one of the most promising polo players in America. This fact was plainly to be seen after following his work against some of the local players. He has always been interested in polo, but after playing the game for some time took up court tennis, and during the winter season has confined his athletics mainly to this sport. That he has won the greatest honors in the world in this branch of sport is certain, as his defeat of Kinsella and Crane, added to victories over the greatest English players, gives him the honors.

Many of the local enthusiasts believed that Gould would be able to show his worth on the polo field, but none were expecting the riding and dashing manner which was observed in the practise game. True, it was only a test for the ponies, but the enthusiasts saw enough to warrant their making the statement that Gould should be classed with the leading players of Hawaii.

In a match game playing at No. 2 Gould showed unusual ability in getting the ball away in short shots and scored two goals during the afternoon by riding them out, mounted on a green pony. Captain Harold Rice was at No. 2, Arthur Baldwin at No. 3 and James Spalding at No. 4. This team defeated the Oahu players by a score of 5 to 3. The Oahu team had Arthur Rice at No. 4, Harold Castle No. 5, Bob Shingle at No. 3 and Walter Macfarlane at No. 1.

Aside from Gould's play, which was new to the spectators, the feature of the match was the work of James Spalding of Kamae, at No. 4. About ten years ago he was considered the best player in Hawaii, and with C. S. Furlong, one of the fastest horses at Reno, coming at Reno, coming.

Furlong has been racing at the Reno meeting, and reports received from the Nevada metropolis state that this horse will be able to cover the mile around 1:40. In a news report received from Reno, Furlong made a great showing against George Winsfield's Scarlet Oaks in the 1 1/2 furlong, finishing second, a neck back. Scarlet Oaks came home to the wire in 1:37.

Further reports show that Scarlet Oaks ran five furlongs for a track record three days later. Scarlet Oaks is by Dick Wells's Glenn, and one of the favorites of the Winsfield stable. The coming of Furlong to the autumn meeting is certain to create much interest, as this entry may go after the mark now held by Onesta. One of the best of the Reno pack will accompany Furlong.

Whether or not this team would be willing to play for the championship is not known, but the consensus of opinion is that the boys are showing a vast improvement over the first day when the mallets were not unlike telegraph poles.

Players will practise every Wednesday and Saturday afternoons at the polo field, and the next practise on Saturday will begin about 2 o'clock. The game on Saturday will feature a contest between the visitors and home guard. After the defeat by the visitors the friends here are out for revenge, and the practise game may amount to more than a mere workout for the ponies. A number of new ponies are being schooled, and in the last practise three or four of them looked promising.

It is rumored that Gould may make his home here during the summer, and although this is not certain, he is sure to remain this year until after the polo season. Should he decide to come here for the polo season each year, Hawaii could then add one more to the many star players who have won honors on the mainland.

WATERHOUSE COMPANY AND STATIONERS TO MEET



FORT SHAFTER, July 27.—It was really the best game of the season. Company I of the Engineers defeated Company H, 2nd Infantry, one to nothing. The game was one of the fastest ever played on the Shafter diamond and the fans, sensing a good game, turned out in large numbers.

Spectacular fielding, brilliant pitching and an occasional hit at the right time kept the fans on edge throughout the entire session and the only thing to mar the day was a decision by Culppeper in the last of the eighth which eventually turned the tide in favor of the bridge builders. With a man on first and second O'Dell executed a wild pitch, the ball hitting the rubber while Hayes blocked it sufficiently with his shin guards to keep it from going more than an arm's length behind him. The runner on second attempted to make third on the muff but Hayes caught him off the sack with room to spare and to all present was clearly out. Culppeper, however, waived both men back to their bases on the ground that Yatsko had fouled the ball; Yatsko then came through with a nice swing to left which scored Stockwell from second. If Yatsko fouled the ball, six hundred pairs of eyes need immediate treatment as none saw Yatsko even make an effort to swing the bat at a ball that was plainly a wild pitch.

All-Star Aggregation of Former Coasters May Be Seen Here This Autumn

The above aggregation may be the next visitors to meet the local ball clubs at Athletic Park. Ed Nell has written to Oscar Vitt, the peppery third baseman of the Detroit Tigers, asking him to bring a star team of former Coasters here for a series of games with the local teams.

According to communications with Vitt, the former Seal states that he intends to bring players who live on the coast, and the above mentioned players are mentioned in the tentative lineup. Whether or not this aggregation will make the trip rests, of course, with the expense money guaranteed.

Come Along, Ty

This will not in any sense be a Detroit team, and the chances of Tyrus R. Cobb and Sam Crawford coming are mighty slim, but of course they would be welcomed. This aggregation is gathered from six major league teams and one from the Coast League. The Quakers and Tigers break even in representatives with four each. The world's champions will send three stars and the White Sox two. Cincinnati, Braves and Seals will have one each.

In securing a strong team Vitt has mentioned the above list, but whether or not there will be five outfielders on the team is a question. It is thought that he will select two catchers, three pitchers and seven other players from this aggregation. At any rate the list would give the fans an idea of the baseball played in the big brush, and the local teams would have considerable trouble in stopping an aggregation of this kind.

Strong Team

That Ed Nell will bring only a team of standing is assured, as he knows baseball from Alpha to Omega, and fans of this city will be confident that there will not be any frosts in the deal. Ed is friendly with Vitt, and the players would make the trip merely for the trip. This does not mean that there will be a lack in baseball, as players who have performed on the coast have starred in winter baseball.

An aggregation of this kind would not meet with the same experience that Santa Clara did, and the fans would witness some real baseball, instead of listless play as seen in the last series. Right now college teams do not look to be an attraction, as if a Santa Clara team cannot win from the locals then there is little hope for Stanford, Washington or California making a cleanup.
