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OUTRIGGERITES ARE VOTING FOR OFFICERS TODAY

Swimming Club of Waikiki Is Holding Annual Meeting At Grounds This Afternoon

Members of the Outrigger Canoe Club are holding their annual meeting and election of officers this afternoon at the club's grounds, Waikiki. Candidates for president, as announced yesterday by the Star-Bulletin, are G. H. Tuttle, the present incumbent; and H. B. Campbell, former treasurer.

For vice-president the candidates are G. H. Buttolph, present incumbent, who has been acting president for several months; and Walter Duisenberg.

There is no contest for secretary or treasurer, the present incumbents, J. Ashman Beaven and L. C. Thompson, being the only ones named for these respective offices.

For captain, G. D. Center, former captain, and L. Fullard Leo, world-known amateur natator, are running, while for chairman of the house committee the contestants are E. M. Ehrhorn, present director and former chairman of the committee, and Roger C. Rice, engineer of the U. S. Geological Survey office in this city.

For chairman of the order and entertainment committee two candidates are running—Harry B. Newcomb, the present incumbent, and Warren Dease, assistant manager of the Sun Life Insurance Company of Canada.

Nine candidates for the board of directors have been named by the nominating committee, from which two will be elected. The candidates include Harry B. Campbell, Warren Dease, Ehrhorn, L. Fullard Leo, Harry B. Newcomb, A. J. Porter, Roger C. Rice, and Guy H. Tuttle.

The board of directors is composed of seven officers elected and two elected directors, a total of nine. The two candidates not elected to other offices receiving the largest number of votes for director will be the elected directors.

Success of Outings Warrants Trail and Mountain Club In New Move

Sunday, August 20th—To Koko Head, including lunch, \$1.25. (Time to visit crater, blow-hole, hieroglyphic caves, swimming and fishing.)

Sunday, August 27th—To Kaneohe Bay (lunch not included), \$1. (Boating may be enjoyed or the Coral Gardens visited in glass-bottom boats at reduced rates.)
