MANY HONOLULU

FOLK RETURN TODAY

With over 1000 bills of lading representing 8646 tons of freight for island merchants the Matson liner Matsonia, Capt. Chas. Peterson, arrived here this morning from San Francisco and docked at Pier 15. The voyage was a very pleasant one as she rode very steadily with the big cargo.

The Matsonia brought a big list of passengers of whom 188 were cabin and 35 steerage. A large number of Honoluluans returned from vacations on the mainland. Freight for island ports was Honolulu 7022 tons, Hilo 1392, Kaunapali 16 and Port Allen 16. Mail was 493 bags, and express 87 packages. Early advices from the Matsonia reported 49 automobiles, but according to Purser P. O. Whitney there are only 18 for Honolulu and one for Hilo.

Among the visitors to Honolulu on the Matsonia were H. Ham, vice-president of the Foster Information Bureau of New York, who is here to obtain data on the islands; Dr. Stafford and Miss Rose Janowitz, who are connected with the Aloha Moving Picture Company and are reported to have come here to finish arrangements for taking pictures; Randall, J. C. S. O., and C. S. Chase, four brothers, who for the first time in 40 years, have been on a vacation trip together; Mrs. J. C. Ross and Miss Elizabeth Rees of Memphis, Tenn., and J. Pratt, wealthy businessman of the Northwest and Alaska, who has come here to find an ideal place to spend the rest of his life.

HARBOR NOTES

The next mail for San Francisco goes on the Oceanic steamer Ventura sailing from here Thursday, August 17.

The next mail from San Francisco will arrive Monday, August 21, on the Oceanic steamer Sierra, which leaves San Francisco today.

The Oceanic steamer Sierra is due to leave San Francisco today for Honolulu and Sydney. She is due here August 21.

The British steamer Kestrel will sail for Fanning and Washington islands August 22, taking 125 tons of supplies and the families of six operators on the islands.

Another vessel which left Pacific coast ports for the Orient and never arrived is the Rio Pasig, which left Seattle January 2 for Vladivostok with a general cargo and is now reported lost.

The Matson steamer Matsonia will sail for Hilo Thursday evening, leaving Pier 19 at 8 o'clock. She will return Monday morning and sail for San Francisco at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, August 23.

The U. S. lighthouse tender Columbine returned from Maui Monday night. On August 22 and 24 she will take part in the night gun practise, using her searchlight to mark where the shots fall.

The Mauna Loa reported the following sugar awaiting shipment on Hawaii: Honolulu 7983 bags and Punaluu 3005. Balance of sugar in warehouse at Punaluu waiting shipment is 5728 bags.

According to the Mauna Kea the lumber schooner Robert Hind finished discharging her cargo of lumber Monday, was fumigated today and will sail for Puget Sound Wednesday morning. She has been chartered to take lumber to Australia in October.

Bringing 118 cabin and 95 deck passengers from Hilo and Maui ports the Inter-island steamer Mauna Kea arrived here today. Her cargo consisted of 450 bags of sugar, 197 pieces of ohia lumber, 300 cross arms, 16 bales vegetables, 203 packages sundries, three automobiles, two cows and one calf.

The Mauna Kea reported the following sugar on Hawaii waiting shipment: Oahu 35,850 bags, Waiakea 4500, Waikua 8400, Onomea 10,978, Pepeekeo 6882, Hakalau 12,180, Laupahoehoe 9168, Kailiki 10,144, Kukulu 4938, Hamakua 13,058, Paaahuu 3005, Honokaa 13,200, Punaluu 6851.

According to advices received from Sydney, the American-Hawaiian steamer Floridian left there for Honolulu August 12 with a cargo of coal. She took a cargo of lumber from Puget Sound to Sydney. From here she will take sugar to San Francisco. She is expected here some time the end of this month.

According to officers on both the Matsonia and Hyades the freight congestion on the Matson wharves at San Francisco, due to the strike which tied up all merchandise, will not be relieved for at least two months more. Drays filled with freight remain outside of the wharves all night in order not to give up their turn. Horses are taken back to the stables and watchmen are left in charge of the wagons.

Because she had not been fumigated for over six months the Matson steamer Hyades, which arrived last Monday night off port, was taken to the quarantine wharf this morning, but later released because of explosion on board. She will probably be fumigated later. Cargo on board for Honolulu was 4243 tons including fertilizer, shooks and oil, for Kahului 566 tons, Port Allen 899 tons, Kaunapali 432 tons and for Hilo 388. Captain W. M. Rind is master.

From Hawaii ports the Inter-island steamer Mauna Loa arrived in port this morning with 39 cabin and 28 deck passengers. Cargo for Honolulu was 6400 bags of H. A. C. sugar, 172 bags of coffee, 68 boxes pears, two boxes and three barrels of watermelons, seven bags awa, 91 bunches bananas, 297 pieces koa lumber, 25 head of cattle, 32 crates chickens, 118 pigs, six crates eggs, 67 bundles of hides, 35 quarters of beef and 185 packages of sundries.

VENTURA TAKING

RECORD CARGO THURSDAY

Taking the largest cargo and the largest passenger list ever carried by an Oceanic steamer from Honolulu, the Ventura will sail from here Thursday evening at 7 o'clock for San Francisco with mail. She will arrive here early Thursday morning from Sydney and Pago-Pago two days late.

There are only two berths left in the first cabin, one in the second and the steerage is full. Passengers from here total 161, of whom 132 are in the first cabin, 16 in the second and 12 steerage.

Freight from here is 1350 tons and includes 9200 cases canned pines, 500 bales hides, 500 cases honey, 400 bunches bananas, 150 bags rice and general merchandise. Freight for Honolulu is only 60 tons.

MANY PASSENGERS ARE BOOKED ON NIAGARA

The Canadian-Australasian steamer Niagara will arrive here early Friday morning from Sydney and Suva and dock at Pier 7. She will sail the same day at 2:30 p. m. for Victoria and Vancouver, taking mail for all coast ports.

Steamers leaving Honolulu this week are taking record cargoes and the Niagara is no exception. Freight from here is 350 tons, including 10,000 cases of canned pines. The number of passengers booked is also much larger than usual. She is taking 109 from here and there are few berths left.

THUMB PRINTS ON STRIKE TALK IS CAUSING DULL STOCK MARKET

PASSPORTS ARE PERMITTED

A letter was received this morning by Malcolm A. Franklin, collector of customs, from E. G. Chamberlain, commissioner of navigation at Washington, which stated that it is very important that American sailors leaving for belligerent countries should take out passports and authorized him to issue certificates of American citizenship to all American sailors who apply.

On all passports it is necessary to have the holder's picture attached, but in case of sailors, the letter stated, if they do not want the pictures, thumb prints on the passport will be sufficient. This is the first time that authority to use thumb prints has been received at the local office.

The letter also said that collectors of vessels who have been licensed by the U. S. steamboat inspection service need not obtain passports, as the license proves his citizenship.

CAUSING DULL STOCK MARKET

So far as volume of trading went unlisted securities overshadowed interest in the stocks regularly dealt in on the exchange. Honolulu Oil was most in demand and in all 3550 shares were dealt in, all sales being at \$3.40. Next in volume were Mineral Products, 2100 shares at 95 cents. Of the other sales reported were 1200 Mountain King at 60 cents, 1000 Tipperary at 9 cents and 200 Engels Copper at \$2.50.

Of the listed securities between boards 250 Oiaa sold at \$17.50, 155 Pacific Sugar Mill at \$20, 50 Kahuku at \$22, 10 Oahu Railway at \$160 and 50 McByrde at \$12.37 1/2.

At the session 50 shares of Pineapple sold at \$47.50.

It is generally agreed that the market seriously feels the uncertainty as to transportation conditions arising out of possibilities for the mainland railroad strike.
