## Park Management Wanted 50% Say 25th Ball Tossers

### That Was Reason the Wrecking Crew Did Not Play Chinese Team on Sunday Afternoon—Schofield People Say They Do Not Want to Play Ball Just to Raise Funds for Park—Will Play Any All-Star Team of Hawaii

SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Aug. 21.—The Sunday game between the 25th Infantry and the Chinese was not called off because of any exorbitant demand on the part of Lieut. Chaney, representing the 25th Infantry, but because the Athletic Park officials continued to kill good baseball by their hold-up tactics.

There is no doubt about the fact that these two teams are the only ones in the island that put up a first class article of ball, and any game scheduled between them is certain to draw a banner crowd. Indeed, a single game with these two teams contesting is far preferable to the Honolulu fans than a doubleheader in which two mediocre teams hold forth for the first part of the afternoon.

Wanted—50 Per Cent.  
So the game as tentatively suggested was bound to mean a big gate and a winning financial venture to all concerned. The park people saw the opportunity and as usual made the following terms: The park management to get 50 per cent of the net gate and the teams to divide the remaining fifty on a 60, 40 basis.

The net was dependent upon the expenses as given by the management and consequently could be raised or lowered at pleasure. What the management overlooked in the expense account was sure to be obtained in the 50 per cent cut they wished to receive. This left the two teams struggling for a 60-40 division of \$150 at the most.

Thirty-five for the Seat.  
The people of Honolulu can see Athletic Park any time they wish by taking the street car or a taxi and it will not cost them as much as the management wishes to assess them on a Sunday. If the good fans will realize that when they pay fifty cents to see a ball game in this park, at least thirty-five cents of the half-dollar is just for the privilege of spending two hours of their time on one of the seats and the remaining fifteen cents is spent to furnish the attraction the quality of previous attractions needs no explanation.

With no desire to boast, the 25th Infantry feels that it has given Honolulu a high grade of the national game, and it is willing to play in the city at any time and against any team for an equitable share of the gate. It does not care to be exploited and advertised to simply enrich Athletic Park. This regiment has always given clean and willing sport in any athletic event. Its participation in any game or contest, however, is governed by the athletic officer of the regiment and not by anyone else. No park official has the authority to schedule a game or advertise a game for its ball team unless a satisfactory arrangement has been made with the athletic officer. This, however, has been done as on last Sunday, and when the 25th Infantry refused to accept the hold up terms offered it, the blame and censure attached to its non-appearance in a prematurely advertised game is laid to the 25th.
