

# SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS

## WILHELMINA DUE TOMORROW AT NINE

With 154 cabin and 24 steerage passengers the Matson steamer Wilhelmina will arrive here Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock from San Francisco and dock at Pier 15. Total cargo on board is 7202 tons, of which 6219 is for Honolulu and 983 for Hilo. She is also bringing 753 bags of mail, 151 packages of express and six automobiles.

Wednesday the O. S. K. steamer Seattle Maru will arrive from Yokohama. She has 871 tons of freight for Honolulu and 137 steerage passengers, according to a radio received this morning at Castle & Cooke's, local agents. She will dock at Pier 7.

The T. K. K. liner Tenyo Maru is due from San Francisco Friday morning and will dock at Pier 7. From here she has room for 25 cabin and 415 steerage passengers and this space has already been nearly booked up. She is expected to sail the same afternoon for Yokohama, taking mail.

## JAPAN PLANS TO IMPROVE SHIP CONDITIONS

TOKIO, Japan.—Means to improve shipping conditions and remedy the shortage of bottoms during the war were discussed at a recent meeting of the sub-committee of the Government Economic Commission in charge of trade and communication.

Several important steps were decided upon by the committee members. The number of vessels for Japanese service will be increased by purchasing foreign ships or building new ones at home docks. Freight rates will be raised; present systems of navigation employed by different lines will be adjusted; subsidized vessels will be prohibited from carrying cargoes from foreign ports; limitation will be put on the lines of service by ships not subsidized by the government, and ways for the use of vessels will be regulated.

## SHINYO MARU SAILS: HAS CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH

## HARBOR NOTES

The next mail from Manila will arrive September 4 or 5 on the U. S. army transport Sheridan.

The next mail for San Francisco will go in the Matson steamer Lurline, sailing at noon Tuesday from Pier 19.

The next mail for Japan, China and the Philippines will go September 1 in the T. K. K. steamer Tenyo Maru.

The Standard Oil steamer Col. E. L. Drake, which arrived here Saturday afternoon, sailed for San Francisco Sunday.

Sugar waiting shipment on Kauai is as follows: Hawaiian 2003 bags, McBryde 9496, Lihue 7500 and Makee 61,000.

The American steamer Falcon arrived this morning from Hilo to load canned pineapples for Libby, McNeill & Libby.

The Inter-island steamer Kaulani arrived Sunday from Kauai and Niihau with one pig, 231 bags rice and 23 packages sundries.

Today south bound the Oceanic steamer Sierra arrived at Pago Pago and Tuesday morning the Sonoma north bound will arrive at the same place. The Sonoma is due here September 5.

The Union Oil steamer Santa Maria left early this morning for Hilo where she will finish discharging her cargo of oil. It is not known as yet whether she will return to San Francisco in ballast or load molasses.

A collision is reported from the Panama Canal in which the Arborea, one of the two new American-Hawaiian lumber steamers, collided with the steamer Elm Branch. The latter suffered the more.

With 3762 bags of sugar, this being the last shipment this season from Honolulu, the Inter-island steamer Hanaia arrived Sunday from Hawaii ports. Inward she passed the Matson power schooner Annie Johnson bound for San Francisco with sugar from Mahukona.

Tuesday noon the Matson steamer Lurline sails for San Francisco from Pier 19, taking a full passenger list and cargo. The principal items of freight will be 5940 tons of sugar, 1120 tons of molasses, 2500 bunches bananas, 26,000 cases of canned pineapples and general merchandise, a total of 9000 tons, nearly as large as that which she brought down.

From Maui and Molokai the Inter-island steamer Mikahala arrived here Sunday with 25 cabin and 15 deck passengers. Freight on board was 927 bags sugar, 200 bags corn, 90 bags cast, 51 bales hides, 13 cases honey, 17 crates chickens, 38 hogs, 17 head cattle, 16 sheep, 70 calves and 102 packages sundries.

The Inter-island steamer Kinau arrived Sunday morning from Kauai with 67 cabin and 57 deck passengers. Cargo consisted of 100 bags pineapples, three automobiles, one horse and 160 packages of sundries. She reported moderate seas and a fair wind both ways.

The Matson steamer Hilonian, with a full cargo and many passengers, among the latter being about 35 school teachers, who were not able to secure passage on the regular liners, sailed from San Francisco Saturday for Honolulu. The Hilonian seldom carries that number of passengers and it is entirely due to the kindness of Capt. Matson, who placed the steamer at the disposal of the teachers, who otherwise would not have been able to arrive here in time for school.

## BIG FREIGHTER ARRIVES WITH COAL CARGO

Bringing 6919 long tons of coal for the Inter-island, the big American-Hawaiian freighter Floridian arrived here Sunday afternoon from Newcastle in the record time of 15 days and 16 hours. This is the fastest time on record for a freighter, although several times the Oceanic steamers have made better. Capt. J. F. Nichols is master.

The Floridian is one of the new American-Hawaiian steamers. Recently she made a voyage to the Orient and on her return to San Francisco was chartered by the Union Steamship Company to carry a cargo of fuel to Australia. From here she will carry the last cargo of sugar this season taken by the American-Hawaiian boats, the Mexican and Texan having already finished. She also brought two sacks of mail.

The Floridian is 415 feet in length, 52.7 beam, 28.1 depth of hold and 6935 gross tons.

## ENGINEERS TO DREDGE OUT MUD WASHED INTO HARBOR BY STREAMS

A survey preliminary to dredging between Piers 15 and 16, clearing out the mud washed into the slip by Nuuanu stream in the last year and also for dredging between Piers 6 and 7 for the same purpose, was begun today by engineers of the board of harbor commissioners, who were directed Saturday by Chairman Charles R. Forbes to begin these activities.
