MANY TEACHERS ECUADOR IS FINE GREAT NORTHERN COME ON THE STEAMER, CAPT. NELSON SAYS WILHELMINA TO HAVE MEN'S CLUB ROOM

Bringing many island people from their vacation on the mainland the Matson steamer Wilhelmina, Capt. Peter Johnson, arrived this morning from San Francisco at 10:30 o'clock, over three hours late, which was due to the unusually heavy cargo that she carried, totaling 7202 tons. P. H. Levy is purser.

The Wilhelmina also had a large number of passengers—154 cabin and 24 steerage—among whom were 99 school teachers. Mail was 753 bags, express packages 151 and automobiles six.

Of the 7202 tons 6219 are for Honolulu and 983 for Hilo, and the principal items were, cement 5617 bags, bales hay 1932, bricks 75,000, feed 6458 bags, oats 350 tons, piles 50, fertilizer 1000 bags and for railroad delivery 1250 tons.

According to officers on the Wilhelmina freight congestion at San Francisco is still acute and officials of the Matson company are working on plans to relieve this condition. Just what they will do is not definitely known. They might charter a steamer if a reasonable one can be obtained. Steamers, however, are now in great demand and the present rates are so high that it would not be profitable for inter-island trade to charter a steamer at the prevailing prices.

Purser Levy said that the voyage was uneventful, weather was fair all the way and with the heavy cargo the steamer rode steadily.

At noon today the Matson steamer Lurline with 49 cabin passengers and approximately 9000 tons of freight sailed for San Francisco from pier 19, taking mail. Her cargo consisted of sugar, canned pines, bananas and general merchandise.

UNION STEAMSHIP CO. IS BUILDING TWO NEW BOATS FOR COAST TRADE

Two new steamers which will represent the latest word in refrigerated cargo-carriers are now under construction for the Union Steamship Company of Australia, and when completed it is understood it is the intention of the company to place them on the Australia-Pacific coast trade in order to improve that service.

During the past year the Union company has disposed of three of its old steamers to various buyers.

LUMBER

It is reported in the press that a development company at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, began a preliminary survey on the Bay of Fundy tide-power project at Cape Split this week, with the work under the direction of an electrical expert from the United States. Its purpose is to develop a power plant at that point by utilizing the high tides of the Bay of Fundy.

Ira Nelson Morris of Chicago, American minister to Sweden, asked for Kirkwall on the Norwegian-American steamer Bergensford.

With the Hawaiian band playing Aloha Oe and Mayor Lane and other officials at the wharf to meet her, the new Pacific Mail steamer Ecuador upon her arrival here Sunday morning will be given a real Hawaiian welcome in honor of the resuming of the service which was discontinued several months ago.

The Ecuador left San Francisco Sunday with every one of her 115 cabin and 175 steerage berths taken and a full cargo. From here there will be room for neither passengers nor freight. She will arrive here Sunday morning, September 3, and sail the same afternoon for the Orient.

The Ecuador arrived at San Francisco August 23 and the Chronicle says: "The Ecuador, green of hull and white of superstructure, is one of the most luxuriously fitted vessels that ever entered San Francisco harbor. According to her skipper, Capt. A. W. Nelson who has gained fame as an author of sea stories, as well as a master of deep-sea going vessels for the past 30 years, the new Pacific Mail ship is a fine command, and behaved splendidly during the voyage across the Atlantic seaboard.

"The Venezuela and the Colombia, two sister ships bought by the Pacific Mail from Dutch builders at the same time as the Ecuador, will arrive within the next month, and will be put on the run to the Orient."
