FATHER LOUIS' WORK IN HILO FOR BOYS' HOME MEETS WITH SUCCESS

Bishop Libert Will Go to Crescent City Next Week for Dedication of Institution

Due to the efforts of Father Aloysius Borghouts of the Catholic mission in Hilo, the Big Island will soon open a boys' detention home. From time to time news from Hilo relating to the project has appeared in the columns of the Star-Bulletin and those who have followed the movement with interest will be glad to hear of its early realization.

The new home is located on the grounds of the St. Mary's School for Boys, a Catholic institution, but is not sectarian in character. Father Aloysius, often called Father Louis by those who know him, was appointed probation officer by Former Judge Parsons and from his work conceived the idea of the detention home.

Bishop Libert will go to Hilo next Wednesday and on Thursday the dedication ceremonies will take place. The Reverend Aloysius Borghouts was born in Holland in 1865, entering the congregation of the Sacred Hearts in 1895. The priesthood was conferred on him in Honolulu with Fathers Ulrich and Adalbert in 1909. As his priestly labors have since his ordination been confined to the island of Hawaii, he may be said to be an expert in that particular field. The boys' home having been the object of his ambition and the burden of his prayer, Father Louis, as he is often called, will be keenly disappointed if he does not realize funds for the upkeep of the new institution.

The Right Reverend Bishop will be accompanied on his journey to the second city by Brother Sylvester, the party planning to spend about a week in Hawaii. As Hilo, by reason of the Civic Convention, is attracting so

much notice at the present time, it is expected that the boys will be benefited by the delegation's visit to the Crescent City. In Honolulu Father Louis' labors and their home are represented by Father Rodriguez of the Catholic cathedral on Fort street. Donations toward the upkeep of the home will be gratefully received and acknowledged by the latter.

BOYS' CLUBS TO START SEASON WITH MUCH VIM

Kaimuki is First in Line and Opens This Evening For 1916-17 Term

This evening at Kaimuki the Boys' Clubs of Honolulu open for the season of 1916 and 1917. The Kaimuki club will have as its leader Mr. Herbert Alexander, who since being here in Hawaii has demonstrated his ability as a high-grade athlete along gymnasium lines many times. New equipment will be added to the Kaimuki club.

Monday night the new \$6000 hall at Kakaako will open its doors and a complete reorganization of the boys' club work in the Kakaako district will take place. The new hall has a floor space of 85 by 55 feet and 20 feet clear to the rafters and is the most up-to-date building of its kind in the islands. This fine new building will house five different clubs: The Kakaakos, the N. A. C.'s, the Honolulu, the Star-Bulletin and the Kakaako Girls' Club. The last named club will start September 16 and will be composed of juniors and seniors, the first named meeting and receiving instruction from 6:30 to 7:45, and the seniors from 7:45 to 9:30.

Kauliwele also opens on Monday night and this remodeled clubhouse will be the home of two separate boys' clubs and one girls' club. The S. S. Boys' Club meets on Monday night, the Kakaako Midgets and Juniors on Tuesday night and the Seniors on Thursday night. Friday night is held open for special games, educational talks and socials of various kinds.

S. W. Robley as community secretary supervises all of these clubs and has indeed been fortunate in surrounding himself with loyal, competent assistants.

Starting with October 1 Robley will also begin graded drill work among the men at the Oahu prison.

This is Mr. Robley's third season at the head of the boys' club work of Honolulu and the work has most assuredly prospered in a wonderful way under his supervision. September, 1914, there were four clubs with a total membership of 120 and a total average attendance of 55. September, 1915, the number of clubs had increased to seven with a membership of 240, and this month of 1916 finds the clubs increased to 12 with a conservative estimate of a membership of 400 and a total monthly attendance of about 3000.

The following men have been selected to head a special committee that will have charge of all extension club work under the supervision of Robley: G. H. Tuttle, Ed Towse, Geo. Waterhouse, T. H. Richards and H. McVey.
