KEOHOKALOLE IS RELEASED; BOND FIXED AT \$3000

"Jimmy" Ah Chuck and David Notley Are Sureties for Alleged Postal Embezzler

Morris Keohokalole, Democratic wheel-horse and delegate to the national convention at St. Louis, who is charged with the embezzlement of funds from the post office at Pala, Maui, of which he is postmaster, was released from the custody of Marshal J. J. Smiddy late Wednesday afternoon on bond in the sum of \$3000. His sureties are "Jimmy" Ah Chuck and David Notley.

U. S. Commissioner George S. Curry fixed Keohokalole's bond shortly after 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, following the Pala postmaster's arrival from the mainland in the custody of a deputy U. S. marshal from San Francisco. But it was not until late in the afternoon of the same day that Keohokalole obtained his release. Arrangements for the bondsmen, it is understood, were made by Attorney Nos Ahihi, who Keohokalole says will be his attorney.

It has been announced in federal court circles that Keohokalole has promised Postoffice Inspector Thomas Flavin every assistance in the latter's investigation of the affair at the Pala postoffice, and that he may return to Pala within a short time. Mrs. Keohokalole is now in Honolulu.

Keohokalole has waived a preliminary hearing of his case before U. S. Commissioner Curry and has been bound over to the October term of the federal grand jury. The members of the new grand jury are scheduled to hold their first meeting on October 9 at 10 o'clock in the morning.

THOUSANDS HAVE SEATS IN SCHOOLS

13,322 Students Enrolled to Date in Public Institutions on Oahu

Twenty-eight of the 36 public schools on Oahu had reported to the department of public instruction up to 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, showing an enrollment to date of 13,322 students, which is a material increase over the enrollment at the beginning of the school term last year. It is expected that this number will be raised to about 13,500 by the reports of those schools which have not yet figured their enrollments.

In those schools which have reported there are 2656 students in the first and 619 in the eighth grades. The largest enrollment is at the Kalaheo School, Palama, being 1398. At this school there are 74 students in the eighth grades and 348 in the first grades. Central Grammar, with its new 12-room building, has an enrollment of 1137, 94 being in the eighth grade and 273 in the first grade.

The reports of many of the schools show a lack of seating capacity, especially in the first grade rooms. At Liliuokalani there is an enrollment of 110 in the first grade, and a seating capacity for only 85, while at Central Grammar, in the first grade, there is an enrollment of 273 and a seating capacity of 262. However, the department reports that room is being found for all students and that the schools are not troubled with the overcrowding of the last few years.

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NAVAL MILITIA IS READY FOR CRUISE

waiting on the dock, having been trucked down.

Looking fit in their natty white uniforms and black ties, the militiamen presented a pretty picture as they lined up on the dock below the big gray fighting craft on which they are to make the cruise. Orders passed here and there from officers, there was a brief inspection to see that all was in shape, then at a given signal each man hoisted his bundle to his shoulder and stepped into line to march up the aft gangway.

There was a small crowd of sweethearts and wives waiting on the dock, all of which added to make the departure as of a real cruise.

"Daddy go by-by," said a young mother to a yellow-haired 3-year-old, as the line marched up, and the child waved and called, attracting the smiles of half a dozen comrades of the militiamen in question.

Further back bashful girls hung in groups of twos and threes, waving goodby to those they knew among the departing one. Mothers stood here and there looking with admiring eyes upon their sons.

Immediately after the men had ascended the gangplank they were mustered on the after-deck, port side, for final inspection before being taken over by details of the St. Louis crew, later to be taken below and shown their quarters and their work.

Good-natured sailors among the crew smiled almost bashfully at the work of "showing" the new ones the parts of the big boat, but all seemed happy, and it is safe to say that the cruise will be a great thing to bring civilian and sailor together.

The boat will not hurry on the cruise tonight, according to Capt. Houston, who said today that there is ample time and that more attention will be paid to instruction of the recruits than to speed. The vessel will reach Waimea tomorrow morning at daybreak and will make a cruise of the island, coming back to this port Sunday.

Brig-Gen. Samuel I. Johnson, who will accompany the militia, went on board this morning and watched the inspection, together with Maj. L. W. Redington of the adjutant's office.

Officers of the St. Louis and of the Naval Militia have been invited to a banquet tomorrow night at Waimea as guests of the officers of the Kaula regiment, the 4th Infantry. At this banquet the affairs of the National Guard will be discussed. A dance will be held later for the militiamen.

Ensign W. H. Stroud, commanding the militia, is at home on the sea and swung into the work this morning like an old hand. Stroud got his first sea training on a training ship—the W. H. Adams—at the time they were still kept up by the navy department. He spent two years on this boat, which was a sailing ship, and later went into the navy, where he spent three years, ending his service in 1898. He was on the gunboat Bennington, which later was damaged so severely by an explosion.

Stroud also took part in three trans-pacific yacht races in the yacht Hawaii, sailing in 1908, 1910 and 1912. Like the officers of the militia are Ensign S. W. Taylor, Lieut. G. E. G. McKewan, Ensign Leslie W. Branch, Ensign Henry Engel, Ensign F. D. Gibson and Dr. L. L. Patterson, ship's surgeon.

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FATAL ACCIDENT CAUSED BY CAR HITTING HORSE

Child is Killed, Two Persons Seriously and Four More Slightly Injured

Detailed information of the automobile accident Wednesday at Kuloa, which was bulletined in yesterday's Star-Bulletin, tells of the death of Baby Harold P. Hustace, the serious injury of Mrs. J. A. McGuire and the driver of a hired taxi, Antonio Paresa, and the slight injuries sustained by other occupants, Miss Mary McGuire, Mrs. R. V. Jellings, Joseph Jellings and Mrs. W. J. Jellings.

Mrs. McGuire and Paresa are at the Queen's Hospital, the latter with a broken arm. Mrs. McGuire spent a quiet night, but her condition cannot be ascertained until X-ray pictures to be taken this afternoon are examined. Four-year-old Margaret Jellings was the only occupant who was uninjured.

The story told of the accident this morning is that three horses got in the way and the car struck one and turned over, pinning all but the driver and Miss McGuire under the body. There were seven passengers in the auto, not including the driver.

The baby was the year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold P. Hustace of Kaimuki. The funeral services at 3 o'clock this afternoon at Will's undertaking parlors, with Rev. Thomas Scudder officiating. The baby will be cremated.
