AERO CLUB OF HAWAII ORGANIZES WITH GEN. EVANS AS PRESIDENT

Queen-Liliuokalani One of Honorary Members Chosen at Well Attended Meeting

Hawaii's interest in aviation and appreciation of the leadership taken by Gen. Robert K. Evans to secure an aviation school here, were manifested last night when the commanding general of the Hawaiian Department was elected president of the Aero Club of Hawaii.

The second organization meeting of interested citizens was held in the senate chamber, Capitol, and was attended by more than 50, including several women. Mrs. Evans was one of those present.

A previous canvass by several of the charter members, made among the membership at large, has resulted in a strong sentiment in favor of Gen. Evans as president and Lieut. R. C. Holliday as carried along most of the detailed paper work of organization and has proved himself thoroughly capable. He is, furthermore, a practical aviator and a real enthusiast. The election of these two was therefore urged at a conference which preceded the meeting when Gen. Evans asked a number of those present, with whom he was personally acquainted, to advise him as to organization details.

In order to get the organization under way the "normal" selection committee also recommended that several of the directors—or governors as they are called under the constitution—be named at once and serve until organization is further perfected, this number to be added to later. The ticket was therefore presented to the house and voted through rather informally, but it accomplished the main object of laying a structure so that the club can get down to business at once. The governors selected are as follows:

Walter F. Dillingham, Riley H. Allen, C. W. C. Deering, J. J. Belsler and Capt. R. L. Noggle, Field Company A, Signal Corps, N. G. H.

This, with the election of C. R. Forbes as vice-president, completed the organization. It is desired to add from four to seven more governors, and the board desires to secure on its governing body practical gas-engine men and those with flying experience, if any; also men of mechanical ability who can, at the same time, give time to the further organization of the club.

Bylaws as adopted last night assure the club of a large and popular membership. Gen. Evans is particularly convinced that the membership should include every man, woman and child in Hawaii who is interested in aviation. His suggestion that the initiation fee be \$1 and the dues \$1 a year met with instant assent.

Honorary members, under the constitution adopted last night, are the governor of the territory, the com-

FORMER OFFICER OF LOCAL REGIMENT IS NOW JUNIOR AVIATOR

Officers and men of the 25th Infantry, Schofield Barracks, will be interested in word from Washington to the effect that (Sheldon H. Wheeler, formerly second lieutenant with the regiment has been promoted to the grade of junior officer with rank of first lieutenant.

Lieut. Wheeler, who left Honolulu some months ago, was ordered on duty at San Diego with the aviation section of the signal corps, and later was ordered to Columbus, New Mexico, for duty with the first aerial squadron. His assignment is still with the local regiment.

ANNOUNCE CHANGES IN HEALTH BOARD STAFF

Several changes in the staff of the board of health on different islands were announced at a meeting of that body yesterday afternoon. At Pukoo, Molokai, the resignation of Dr. Homer H. Hayes was accepted. Dr. F. G. Sanborn, physician for the Molokai ranch, being appointed in his place. At Makawao, Maui, Dr. A. C. Rothrock was appointed government physician in place of Dr. W. F. McConkey, resigned. Dr. A. F. Jackson will serve temporarily at South Kohala, Hawaii, where he is recuperating, in place of Dr. F. A. St. Sure.

As district nurse for Oahu, tuberculosis bureau, Miss Mary McGuire will fill the vacancy left through the resignation of Mrs. H. A. Franson. Miss McGuire, who returned from the mainland about two months ago, has been filling this place for the last four weeks.

WORK OF INSPECTORS IS PRAISED BY KOONS

A letter has been received by Post-office Inspector Thomas J. Flavin from Inspector S. H. Morse, Inspector in charge of the San Francisco division, postoffice inspection service.

The letter encloses a quotation from a letter written Morse by Chief Inspector John C. Koons, who has just been promoted to the first assistant postmaster generalship, succeeding Daniel C. Raper, now assistant manager of President Wilson's campaign for reelection.

Koons' letter says that on the eve of his taking the new and better position he wishes to assure the inspectors that he appreciates their faithful service during his incumbency. Koons took the chief inspectorship a year ago last spring.

ORDNANCE MEN DETAILED FOR OTHER POSTS

New Order Places Groups in Infantry, Coast and Field Artillery

Changes of considerable extent in the workings of the ordnance department are named in copies of general orders from the War Department just received, by which sergeants, corporals and privates of the ordnance department are detailed for the first time to the coast defenses, and to infantry, cavalry and field artillery regiments.

The order will add approximately 20 men from the ordnance department to Schofield Barracks, five to Fort Shafter and seven to all of the coast defenses together. Originally the ordnance department has been limited to detachments at arsenals only.

Upon receipt of the new order department commanders will take steps to add to the regimental and coast defense organizations within their departments," says the order, "the ordnance personnel enumerated above."

This refers to the placing of sergeants, corporals or privates or all at the various posts. In Hawaii—the 9th Field Artillery is to have one sergeant, two corporals and four privates first-class; the 1st Field Artillery is to have the same number with the exception of one sergeant; the 1st, 2d, 25th and 32d Infantry are to have respectively one corporal and one first-class private.

Purposes of the order, according to the order are "for the proper care and preservation of ordnance property."

The places are to be filled either by enlistment or by transfer, recommendations from commanding generals to be forwarded to army headquarters. In the Philippines and Ha-

waiian Departments the noncommissioned officers will be designated by the department commanders in the same manner as is now done with those in the Manila and Hawaiian Ordnance Depots.

Duties will be as follows: Sergeants — Caretakers, clerks, checkers, overseers, foremen of laborers and storekeepers.

Corporals — Caretakers, clerks, checkers, storekeepers and saddlers. Privates, first-class—Packers, messengers, janitors, warehousemen and skilled laborers.

REVOLVERS CONTINUE TO LEAD FIREARM SALES

The sale of revolvers continues to lead all other kinds of firearms, according to reports sent in to the county clerk from business houses and individual registrars.

Between September 5 and 9 local firms reported the sale of 35 revolvers, two shot guns, one rifle and 62 boxes of ammunition, and individuals registered 19 revolvers, two shot guns, two rifles and six boxes of ammunition.
