**SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Sept. 16.**—The Red Cross composed of ladies living at Schofield Barracks, took the practical examination on Wednesday morning and on Thursday morning the written examination was completed.

Major Horace D. Bloombergh lectured on First Aid, Elementary Hygiene and Home Care of the Sick for a period extending over six weeks preparatory to the examinations. These lectures were most interesting and convincing.

Miss Janet Dewar, head nurse in the Children's hospital at Honolulu, conducted the examinations in a most businesslike, though pleasing manner and won the unbounded appreciation of the entire class.

Much credit for the success of the class is due Mrs. Augustine McIntyre, class president, and Mrs. Charles Lloyd, secretary and treasurer of the class. These two ladies worked untiringly and cheerfully, giving much of their time to the details involved and keeping the scheme running smoothly. The class was indeed fortunate to have Mrs. McIntyre for an organizer. She appreciated the necessity for this instruction, having seen strenuous service as a Red Cross nurse on the Austrian front during the present European war.
