GIRL WITH HOMELY FEET.

For one thing, my dear, you have been wearing the wrong sort of shoes, consequently your toes have grown out of shape. A surgeon-chiro-podist will cut the tightened muscles and straighten these and the operation will be neither painful nor expensive. Better have it done at once, and hereafter wear low-heeled, or moderately low-heeled, shoes, and always wear wide toes. Avoid these ugly pointed-toe styles.
