LAST ESTIMATES OF OLAH PRODUCT IS 21,500 TONS

Company Still Grinding, But Manager Thinks Figures Will Not Exceed His

Olah Sugar Company's output for 1916 will not exceed 21,500 tons. This was admitted by A. W. T. Bottomley to Bishop & Company this morning. Grinding has not been completed but the estimate has been once more reduced and this time by about 500 tons. Rumors that were heard about brokerage offices yesterday afternoon relative to the 1916 crop of Olah took definite form this morning. A call at the office of Bishop & Company on A. W. T. Bottomley brought the brief reply: "Olah has not finished grinding yet, but Manager Eckart says that he believes that the year's crop will not exceed 21,500 tons."

The Manual of Hawaiian Securities gave the 1916 estimate of Olah Sugar Company production as 26,300 tons. A few weeks ago that estimate was reduced to about 22,500 tons and the announcement caused considerable of a flurry in the company's stock. The latest reduction is by no means so proportionately great. It leaves the company a crop about two-thirds as large as that of 1915 and is the smallest since 1910.

COL. LENIHAN TO LEAVE FOR WAR COLLEGE SOON

Cable advices received today at headquarters of the Hawaiian Department instruct Lieut. Col. M. J. Lenihan, acting chief of staff, to report at Washington for duty at the War College on October 16. Col. Lenihan will probably sail on the transport due from Manila October 5.

Col. Lenihan has been in the islands since July 13, 1915, having come here from the 7th Infantry for duty at Fort Shafter with the 2d Infantry. He has served in the War College previously as instructor, and was a member of the general staff from August, 1906, to August, 1910.

In May the colonel, then major, was appointed acting chief of staff, filling the place left by the departure of Maj. A. S. Conklin. His promotion to lieutenant-colonel came in August. His successor here is not yet announced.

Orders were also received today directing the appointment of a board of examiners to determine the fitness of Lieut. Col. W. E. Ellis, Fort Ruger, for promotion to the rank of colonel.

This morning the police corridors were crowded with a number of friends who came to sympathize with him in his plight. "Too much sake," say the police.

Hearing of the petition of the Honolulu Rapid Transit & Land Company for registered title to lands in Kakaako and Kakaemoku, this city, will be had in Circuit Judge Whitney's court on October 9. A protest against the granting of the petition has been filed by the city and county, through the city attorney's office.

Whether a person afflicted with leprosy may rightly bring a suit for divorce against husband or wife, as the case may be, and whether the plaintiff is entitled to a divorce because of such affliction, is a question which has been reserved to the supreme court by Circuit Judge Ashford.

MANY ENROLL FOR COURSES AT Y. M. C. A. NIGHT SCHOOL MONDAY

Many requests for admission to the Y. M. C. A. night school were received last evening at the first open night program. According to R. K. Thomas, educational secretary, the number already has reached 20, which surpasses the number for last year at this time. It is expected that a number of members will take the opportunity to enroll for special courses.

PROCLAMATION OF ELECTIONS ISSUED TODAY

Governor Pinkham Also Names 21 More Inspectors for Districts

Governor Pinkham today added a total of 21 names to the list of inspectors of elections already announced by him. This is practically complete now, only two or three more places awaiting appointment.

The governor also issued the proclamation for the general election as required by law. The proclamation names the various polling districts of the territory for both primary and general elections.

GERMANS ADMIT TWO ZEPPELINS WERE SHOT DOWN

That two German Zeppelins were brought down by British gunners in the recent raid on England is admitted in an official German cablegram received today, which also declares that the raid was very successful, much damage being done to establishments of military and industrial importance.

The cablegram says: "BERLIN, Germany, Sept. 25.—On the night of September 24 several squadrons of naval airships extensively bombarded London and places of military importance on the Humber and in the middle counties of England, among which were Nottingham and Sheffield. Success was everywhere visible, with strong conflagrations which could be seen a long while. "One airship, when approaching before crossing to the English coast, was shelled by a patrol boat and during the attack by defensive batteries with fire projectiles.

"The airships silenced some some batteries by well-placed bombs. "Two airships above London fell victims to the defense fire, but the others returned unharmed."

DAISY JEROME STIRS HONOLULU DRAMATIC WORLD

The Australian vaudeville cyclone, Daisy Jerome, has been stirring up considerable excitement in the dramatic world of Honolulu in such a delightful way that the Bijou theater management has asked her to appear there October 1 and 2 and she has accepted.

Miss Jerome came recently from Australia and is on her way to New York City via Los Angeles, where she proposes to have a fling at the movies. In a very quiet and unostentatious way Miss Jerome has been going the rounds of the various army posts to put on a whirlwind skit that has taken the soldiers off their feet. Tonight she goes to Schofield Barracks, where she entertains in company with her assistant pianist Miss Ruby Dent.

In the Pleasanton hotel Miss Jerome entertained last Saturday night in a very informal way for some friends which she had met in Honolulu. These included Miss Suzannah Gregory and Alfred Tinker. In a short time a large circle of Pleasanton guests had gathered around the piano to applaud Miss Jerome's and Miss Dent's every effort.

The Jerome party includes besides Miss Jerome and Miss Dent, Mrs. Emma Jerome, the singer's mother and her manager, Frank B. Smith.
