PETITION TO REDUCE WATER RATES IS READY

May Be Introduced Thursday; Murray is Going After Flat Rate Users

At the meeting of the board of supervisors Thursday evening William Larsen, chairman of the water and sewer committee, will probably present a petition to have the meter water rates reduced from 6-1-2 cents to 5 cents in order to equalize the meter with the flat rate. There have been constant complaints from meter users that the charges are far in excess of those under the old flat rate system and by this reduction it is hoped that the two rates will be more nearly equal.

The main point of issue, however, among the complainants is that they are paying for the expenses caused by the wasting of water by the flat rate users, and to stop this Harry Murray, manager of the water department, is planning a war on the owners to stop this wastage.

A careful inspection will be maintained on all flat rate consumers and Murray has also obtained the cooperation of the public health board who will also report all leaks which come to their attention, particularly in respect to the hours for irrigation. "The hours for irrigation are from 6 to 8 o'clock in the morning and from 4 to 6 in the afternoon and the consumers should know this as the law has been in effect for 20 years," Murray said, "but they constantly disregard it and we are going after them strong."

Showing how leaks in faucets, hose and other water fixtures occur and telling how to repair them, Murray has placed advertisements in all the Japanese and Chinese papers to educate the people and also help them to save money.

In his notice Murray has shown the amount of wastage and the resulting loss of money in different size leaks and has asked them to cooperate with the water department in stopping them by constant inspection and by watching the tenants.

ELECTRIC MOTOR IS HERE, BUT POLES ARE LACKING TO RUN IT

The electric motor for the sewer pumping plant arrived Tuesday on the Wilhelmina and will be installed as soon as possible. There has, however, another difficulty cropped out which will delay the final acceptance of the plant by the loan fund commission and that is: there are no poles with which to string the wires from the power plant to run the motor after it is installed.

If you have any long poles in your back yard call up the sewer department and receive their undying gratitude.

DURIAN DINNER REVIVES PRESS CLUB ONCE MORE

Newspaper Writers Have Novel Experience and Plan for Closer Association

Members of the newspaper fraternity, more than a dozen of them, attended the first Durian dinner ever held in Honolulu tendered to them and to C. Morgan of New South Wales and David Hunter by Alexander Hume Ford at the Union Grill. Morgan is a representative of a touring bureau and young Hunter is here to learn the "newspaper game." On the strength of the dinner, or of the durian, which was a moving cause in any direction, the newspaper men determined that the Press Club shall be reorganized.

At no dinner last evening the editors and writers in attendance unanimously voted that Ford had not done full justice to the durian in the description of it which he had given. He had compared its odor to that of a polecat but had forgotten to say that the polecat he referred to had been eating onions.

But early training as a reporter, the habit with which they had become so thoroughly imbued of "getting the story" regardless of their own feelings, impelled each and every one to try the fruit. And it was good, so good that veteran Dan Logan and the city editors of the Star-Bulletin and the Advertiser all called for a second helping.

Before the durian was cut—it had to be before in order that the speakers might have an audience—young David Hunter and C. Morgan told of their impressions of Honolulu and the aloha for it which had come over them. Next de Vis-Norton talked of the recent Hilo trip and was interrupted when Ford, as host, cut "the melon." After the excitement was over it was decided that the Press Club must be reorganized, Logan and others speaking on the subject and a committee of three is to be named to take up the matter and report at another dinner which will be held in the near future. Ford has offered the rooms of the Pan-Pacific Club for headquarters. It was at first suggested that only actively employed newspaper men in the editorial and reporter rooms be admitted to membership, but there was evidenced a desire to open the door somewhat wider and not to exclude the advertising departments and business offices.

OFFICERS HOLD WRONG MAN, SAYS MAN FROM HAWAII

The Hawaii Shinpo, a local Japanese newspaper, published in this morning's edition an interesting story told by a Japanese who came from Hawaii. His name is Ikeda, and he was a door-keeper of the Japanese Theater nine years ago, and one of the eyewitnesses when the Japanese gambler Nozaki killed his countryman Nishi at the entrance of the theater on the night of July 4, 1907.

Ikeda came from Hilo last week and returned to his home after staying in this city a few days. According to his statement Nozaki, who is now in the hands of police authorities as the slayer of Nishi at Honokaa, is not the right person, though his face and appearance are somewhat like that of the other Nozaki. The real slayer was born in the village of Kahae, in Udo county in the prefecture of Kumamoto, and he is now 44 years old. He had two children and lived with his wife's sister as man and wife. He had a ferocious nature and was a professional gambler. Nishi was born in the village of Goushi, county of Kikuchi.

Ikeda emphasized that the real murderer of Nozaki at Honokaa is still in the island of Hawaii and has not been caught yet.
