## WAR-PARTY IN GERMANY AFTER VON BETHMANN-HOLLWEG

### Strike Mob Derails Engine; Chance Averts Wreck of Laborers' Cars

#### RAILROAD YARD SCENE OF RUSE IN EARLY MORN

Police Taken Unawares When Strikers Spring From Hiding Places and Hurl Empty Gasoline Drums Under Wheels of Locomotives Pulling Cars With Strike-Breakers Bound for Docks

#### NEW VIOLENCE MET LATER WITH BIG GUARD OF MEN; COUNTY ATTORNEY PROBING

Arrests Made of Alleged Active Leaders, Whose Counsel Complains Sheriff Will Not Allow Him to See Them; Jack Edwardson Announces Quitting of Committee Because Strikers Using Force Despite All Advice

Loss of life in a bad wreck in the Oahu railway yards was averted by chance this morning when an engine derailed by a mob of striking waterfronters and their sympathizers bumped along on the ties half a hundred yards without turning over or throwing off the cars conveying strike-breakers which were being pulled behind.

Other developments were these: 1. Massing of 5 police on waterfront to protect strikebreakers from mobs. The police admit they were taken at a loss both yesterday and today but Sheriff Rose is confident that he has plans worked out which will give the necessary protection.

#### STRIKERS IN FORCE DERAIL ENGINE AND STOP MORNING TRAIN

The lawlessness of the striking stevedores attained a fever height at 6:15 this morning when they derailed an engine pulling cars bearing strike-breakers from the Oahu depot to Pier 17. Four closed and locked box-cars made up the train with an engine on each end.

The first obstruction placed in the path of the on-rushing train, an empty gasoline drum, proved effective and the head engine left the rails a short distance Ewa of Iwilei road. Luckily no one was killed and it is considered miraculous that none was injured.

#### ACCOUNTS OF ANOTHER MAUI POST OFFICE RUMORED SHORT ABOUT \$812

##### Case of N. K. Kaloa, Pauwela Postmaster, Will Go to the Federal Grand Jury

WAILUKU, Oct. 4.—Nelson K. Kaloa, postmaster at Pauwela, is under investigation by federal authorities for an alleged shortage of about \$800 in his office accounts, according to reports received here.

The report of an alleged shortage at the Pauwela postoffice was verified today by Postoffice Inspector Flavin who says that according to his investigations about \$812 is missing from the accounts of Postmaster Kaloa.

#### CHINESE DON'T WANT ROYALISTS IN NEW CABINET

##### Opposition to Lu Chen Rsiang Because He has Monarchical Leanings

PEKING, China, Oct. 4.—The Chinese house of representatives today refused to ratify the appointment of Lu Chen Tsiang as foreign minister because he is alleged to have leanings toward the monarchy which China repudiated in rebelling against Yuan Shih-Kai.

#### GERMAN OFFICIAL CABLE

##### GERMAN HEADQUARTERS, Oct. 3.—On the west front near Lombartzeide in Flanders, our sailors from a successful patrol enterprise brought in 22 French.

Further down, in Prince Rupprecht's sector, the battle north of the Somme continues with permanent and powerful artillery dueling. North of Thiepval and northeast of Courcellette we conquered separate pieces of trenches where the British had gotten a footing, capturing several machine guns.

Especially fierce fighting has been taking place between Lesars and the road between Ligny and Thillo, the British, after frightful losses, obtaining a small gain on both sides of the farm of Rancourt L'Abbaye. Nearby, after defeating four French attacks launched in the early morning from Les Boeufs, our artillery held down hostile infantry.

Strong French attacks near and west of the road from Villy to Rancourt and also against the Wood Saint Pierre and Vassat, partly reached our foremost line of defense but by hand-to-hand fighting we cleaned out the invaders.

#### CHANCELLOR IS UNDER FIRE ON NEGOTIATIONS

His Attempts to Reach Agreement With England on Points of Conduct of War Start Fight Against Him in the Reichstag

#### VICTORIES FOR BOTH SIDES ARE TOLD TODAY

Allies Gain Substantially on West, Russians Advance Toward Lemberg, Rumanians Withdraw From Bulgaria; Prince Leopold's Men Hit Slavs Hard

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 4.—The campaign in Germany against Chancellor Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg is assuming more tangible form and has developed as an organized move to force him from the ministry and from public power.

(The campaign against the chancellor is generally credited to the extreme war party and to the followers of the former Grand Admiral von Tirpitz, who counseled radical submarine warfare. The chancellor is credited with wishing to hold the submarine warfare on commerce to a minimum, and also with trying to get agreements with Great Britain for more humane conduct of the war.)

#### HARD-FOUGHT POINT ON WEST FALLS INTO HANDS OF THE BRITISH

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 4.—Eandcourt L'Abbaye, a position on the west Somme sector, for which there has been hard fighting, is now entirely in the hands of the British, who have taken it yard by yard.

#### GERMAN SUCCESSES WON ON TWO EASTERN FRONTS

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 4.—The Russians are continuing their heavy assaults on the Austro-German lines on the east front.

An official announcement reports the defeat of the Russians by the troops of Prince Leopold. The Rumanians who crossed the Danube river to invade Bulgaria south of Bucharest have been hastily withdrawn as a result of the electrifying movement of von Mackensen's force, which would have cut them off. They rebuilt pontoon bridges and crossed the river.

#### RUSSIANS MAKING NEW ADVANCE TOWARD LEMBERG

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 4.—After three days' incessant fighting the Russians have won a considerable advantage in their drive toward Lemberg, and are now threatening the town of Brazzany, 50 miles southeast of Lemberg, says a Reuter's despatch.

#### SOFIA DOESN'T MENTION RUMANIAN-BULGAR CLASH

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 4.—The Rumanians who invaded Bulgaria are described as "considerable bodies of troops" in an official Bulgarian statement. No mention is made of a clash between the Rumanians and Bulgarians.

#### BIG TOLL OF VESSELS BY GERMAN SUBMARINES

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 4.—Thirty-five vessels of the Allies were destroyed by German submarines in the North Sea and English Channel from September 20 to 29, according to an Overseas News Agency despatch.

#### FRENCH TAKE GERMAN LINES ON WEST FRONT

PARIS, France, Oct. 4.—The fortified line of German defenses on the west front, between Morval and St. Pierre wood has been captured by the French, who took 300 prisoners.
