

# ACCOUNTS OF ANOTHER MAUI POST OFFICE RUMORED SHORT ABOUT \$812

### Case of N. K. Kaloa, Pauwela Postmaster, Will Go to the Federal Grand Jury

[Star-Bulletin Special by Mutual Wireless] WAILUKU, Oct. 4.—Nelson K. Kaloa, postmaster at Pauwela, is under investigation by federal authorities for an alleged shortage of about \$800 in his office accounts, according to reports received here. The Pauwela postoffice has been closed since last Monday and temporarily moved to Haiku. As yet, it is reported, there has been no verification of the alleged shortage. Postoffice Inspector Thomas J. Flavin visited Pauwela last Saturday. Local officials say they have not been informed of the alleged shortage.

The report of an alleged shortage at the Pauwela postoffice was verified today by Postoffice Inspector Flavin, who says that according to his investigations about \$812 is missing from the accounts of Postmaster Kaloa.

### Flavin Makes Investigation

Flavin visited Pauwela last Saturday, closed the postoffice and brought Kaloa's record books and other documents to Honolulu with him.

The district attorney's office says that the matter has been reported there and that Kaloa's case will be brought before the October term of the grand jury, the members of last tribunal being scheduled to have their initial meeting at 10 o'clock next Monday morning in the federal court.

Kaloa, who is a Democrat, is well-known on the Valley Island. **Second Recent Case**  
This is the second postoffice case to be brought to the attention of local federal authorities within the last month and a half. About six weeks ago Morris Keohokalohe, postmaster at Pala, Maui, was arrested in San Francisco at the instance of the local district attorney's office charged with the embezzlement of more than \$1800 of the funds of his office.

Keohokalohe's arrest was made shortly after his return to the coast city from St. Louis, where he attended the Democratic national convention as one of the delegates from Hawaii. He is said to have confessed the embezzlement, according to federal officials, saying that he used the funds to provide for his family. His case will come before the October term of the federal grand jury.

## RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY GIVES OUT ITS VERSION

Declaring that it would be absolutely impossible for the Honolulu Rapid Transit & Land Company to relocate their tracks before the arrival of the new rails and that to lay a temporary track would cause not only too great an expense but also be a constant source of possible accidents, C. G. Ballentyne, manager of the company, gave their side of the question of the Kalakaua avenue improvement project in the following interview:

"Some time ago the Rapid Transit was approached by the road committee of the board of supervisors as to what they would do relative to relocating their tracks. At a meeting between the directors of the company at which the committee was present, a resolution was drawn up, that it was the sense of the directors that the location of the rails be changed to that of a double track, center position.

"Until the contemplated improvements were definitely decided upon, however, the Rapid Transit Company was not in a position to act further in the matter. The question of the validity of any bonds that might be issued by the board of supervisors to cover the work involved had to be decided in the bond suit in connection with the Manoa valley enterprise. Also protests in regard to the Kalakaua avenue improvement which had to be settled before work proceeded.

"As soon as the difficulties were settled, the Rapid Transit took up the matter of extension and filed with the superintendent of public works an application for approval of a new rail section much heavier than formerly used and especially adapted to the modern method of street paving. As soon as the application was approved the Rapid Transit immediately ordered the rails, etc., necessary for relocating the tracks.

"Had we been in a position to place the order six months ago (delivery before the end of this year would have been possible, but on account of present manufacturing conditions it is not possible to get early delivery of the material.) According to advices we have received we need not expect the arrival of any material until September, 1917, if then. It must be borne in mind that we are not responsible for the conditions in the rollings mills in the East.

"As it is necessary that the operation of the Waikiki service shall be maintained without interruption, the old tracks cannot be removed from their present position until such time as the new rails are laid and service is in operation on them.

"As to the construction of a temporary track, if for a financial reason only, this is entirely out of the question as it will cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000 to lay it. There is also a great risk of accidents from tracks laid on top of the ground, damages for which would have to be borne by the Rapid Transit, unless the board of supervisors hold the company free from damages, resulting from such accidents.

"The cost of improving Kalakaua avenue is about \$96,000, which is divided between the property owners and the city. The relocation of the tracks will cost the Rapid Transit approximately \$78,000, which this company has undertaken purely from a pro bono publico standpoint, and it would seem, from our point of view at least, that it is all the people and board should expect from us.

"The plans and specifications for the improvement of Kalakaua avenue show a distance between curbs of 56 feet, nineteen feet of which on each side of the road is to have concrete pavement and the 18 feet in the center, excepting the portion where the new rails will be laid, will be paved with asphaltum macadam. The makai side could easily be paved at once, with half of the center, thus giving a drive 28 feet wide which would give the public a good roadway to and from Waikiki until such time as the tracks can be relocated and the makai side improved. Also the makai side at a cost of from \$800 to \$1000 could be scarified and rolled, thus providing a temporary thoroughfare until the concrete could be laid.

"There is no reason so far as we can see why Kalakaua avenue improvement project should not proceed and relieve the public of a disagreeable condition of roadway at the earliest possible moment."

To the owners, lessees and occupants of lands abutting on Frontage Improvement Number Four—Kalakaua Avenue, and to all persons interested generally: (Examine the Preliminary Assessment Report for this Frontage Improvement for yourself and for your property, and report any errors in frontage, curbing or total assessment to the City and County Engineer prior to or at the public hearing.)

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with Resolution No. 606, and with the Preliminary Report of the City and County Engineer, dated October 3, 1916, including the Corrected Map, Preliminary Assessment Roll and Detail of Description for Frontage Improvement Number Four—Kalakaua Avenue, the Board of Supervisors propose to assess the property abutting on said Frontage Improvement, as provided by Sections 1793-1813, R. L. of Hawaii, 1915, as amended by Acts 164 and 197, Session Laws of Hawaii, 1915, as follows:

1. The description of said Frontage Improvement and the frontage subject to assessment are the same as heretofore established by Resolution No. 574, of said Board, and as set forth in detail in said Corrected Map, Preliminary Assessment Roll and Detail of Description herein specifically referred to and incorporated;

2. The total cost of the improvements upon said portion of Kalakaua Avenue, based upon the bid of the Spalding Construction Company, heretofore conditionally accepted, will be \$96,290.00;

3. The rate for general improvements, including grading, paving, moving and resetting of curbs, engineering and incidentals, to be assessed against all property privately owned abutting on said Frontage Improvement, will be \$4.3075568 per front foot;

4. In addition to the above rate, the property in front of which new curbing is necessary and provided by said improvements, will be assessed \$0.38234804 per front foot; the exact and detailed amounts of new curbing required for each individual frontage and, the assessments therefor are shown on said Corrected Map, Preliminary Assessment Roll and Detail of Description herein incorporated;

5. Assessments shall be due and payable within thirty days after the date of the last publication of the Assessment Ordinance relating thereto, to be hereafter enacted; provided that assessments may be paid at the election of the owner of the land assessed in 10 equal annual installments of principal, together with interest on unpaid principal at 6% per annum, the first of said installments to be due and payable within thirty days after the last publication of the Ordinance aforesaid; failure to pay the whole of any assessment within said period of thirty days will be conclusively held an election on the part of the persons interested in such assessments, whether under a disability or otherwise, to pay in installments; failure to pay the whole or any installment, will be enforced as provided in Sections 1793-1813, Revised Laws, 1915, as amended by Acts 164 and 197, Session Laws, 1915;

6. An issue of Street Improvement Bonds will be authorized for the amount, and for a period, not greater than that of deferred installments of assessments;

7. The proportion of cost to be borne by the City and County of Honolulu is Forty-six Thousand, One Hundred Forty-eight and 20/100 Dollars (\$46,148.20);

8. The total cost to private property is Fifty Thousand, One Hundred Forty-one and 80/100 Dollars (\$50,141.80);

9. And notice is further given that a Public Hearing will be held before the Board of Supervisors at their Assembly Hall respecting the proposed several assessments on October 17, 1916, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., or as soon thereafter as those interested may be heard, at which time and place the said Supervisors will sit as a Board of Equalization to receive complaints or objections respecting the method of apportionment, or respecting the proposed several assessments; and that the Preliminary Assessment Report, including said Corrected Map, Preliminary Assessment Roll and Detail of Description may be seen and examined at the Office of the City and County Engineer in the McIntyre Building, at any time during business hours, prior to and including the date of hearing.

## JAY GOULD GOES WITH BIG ALOHA FOR HAWAII NEI

### Denies Report of Purchase of Home Here, But Expects to Return Later

"We have had a wonderful time in Honolulu; never enjoyed ourselves better in our lives," said Jay Gould this morning 10 minutes before he and his family left on the Matson steamer Wilhelmina for San Francisco and New York.

"Do I want to come back? I certainly do, and just as soon as I can get around to it," commented the New York millionaire as his friends placed about a dozen leis around his neck until he was decorated almost up to his ears. Mrs. Gould and the children were similarly adorned.

"Honolulu's hospitality is abundant and whole-hearted," said Gould. "There is nothing else just like it in the world and we have certainly appreciated the way your society folk do things."

Gould said there is no truth to the report that he had purchased a residence here. He added that he came on July 4, making his stay in the islands exactly three months to a day. He and his family expect to reach New York about the end of this month. They are occupying two de luxe state-rooms on the Wilhelmina.
