WAR SECRETARY APPROVES ARMY DEFENSE PLANS

Information Comes in Letter to Hawaiian Department as to Ultimate Strength

Information that the approval of the secretary of war has been given to the ultimate planing of infantry, cavalry and artillery organizations upon the island of Oahu is contained in a war department letter to Hawaiian headquarters, which was given out Wednesday for publication.

Most of these added forces will be placed at Schofield Barracks, but others will be situated here and there on army land, according to the decision of the war department.

Foremost in the big plan of the department is the establishment of nine regiments (three brigades) of infantry, which will be an increase of five regiments over the present number on the island.

Cavalry strength will remain as it is now, with the one regiment at Schofield Barracks. This will also be true of the field artillery, which will keep its strength of two regiments, light and heavy artillery.

There will be a regiment of engineers, made up of two battalions and two ambulance companies of sanitary troops.

Signal Corps divisions, according to the letter, will consist of one aero squadron, one field battalion and one telegraph company.

The strength of the Coast Artillery will be a total of 1533 enlisted men, besides five field officers, 17 captains and 48 lieutenants.

Infantry brigade commanders, together with their staffs, will total three.

QUARTERMASTER CORPS CLERKS IN NEW CLASS

According to a decision of the quartermaster-general at Washington, which decision has been approved by the judge advocate-general, a distinct class of clerks in the Quartermaster Corps, to be known as field clerks, Quartermaster Corps, has been created by the act of August 29.

This act provides that not to exceed 200 clerks from the Quartermaster Corps who shall have had 12 years of service, at least three years of which shall have been on detached duty away from permanent station, or duty beyond the continental limits of the United States, or both, shall be known as field clerks and shall be subject to the rules and articles of war. This gives to the 200 clerks affected an allowance for quarters, light, and heat, which amounts to about \$28 more than they have formerly received.

TWO PRIVATES GONE FROM 1ST INFANTRY

Two privates from the 1st Infantry, Schofield Barracks—Ysmael Aranzas of Company K and William W. Bostwick of Company G—are listed as deserters in army records. Aranzas left the post on September 23 and Bostwick two days later. Their descriptions are as follows:

Aranzas: Age, 25; dark brown eyes, black hair and ruddy complexion; weight, 140 pounds; height, five feet six inches. Bostwick: Age, 23; light brown eyes, dark brown hair and ruddy complexion; weight, 150 pounds; height, five feet, six and three-fourths inches.

The main roadway through Fort Shafter is being repaired by the quartermaster. The constant wear upon the road has so roughened it in spots that riding in an automobile was not only uncomfortable but expensive.

The most recent improvement in the post has been the planting of hibiscus hedges from the quartermaster office building to the old fire house, from the fire house to the barracks of the quartermaster detachment quarters, thence to the ordnance office and from the old roadway to King street. This will form a large triangle of the beautiful plants, and will adorn the post to a higher degree than ever.

Companies E, F, G and H are now in the hills engaged in the annual proficiency test, under the supervision of the officers who were detailed from the other companies which have already finished.

There will be an informal hop under the auspices of the Fort Shafter hop committee in the assembly room Friday at 9 o'clock.

The Headquarters Company will hold its second dance, for the building and equipping of a day-room, in the Mansfield hall, Spanish War Veterans' Club, on Saturday. It is hoped that all will turn out to help the Headquarters Company in their laudable efforts.

Blank forms for the declaration and application for the support of family under the act of congress approved August 29, 1916, are now to be obtained at the post headquarters through the usual military channels. The form requires name, rank, date of enlistment, date of marriage, whether member of National Guard, whether any other source of income besides enlisted pay, amount required for support of family, etc.

Hereafter until further notice the swimming tank at Fort Shafter will be emptied and refilled Tuesdays and Saturdays.

Bulletin 32, War Department, containing the sections of the Act of Congress revising the Articles of War, with table showing the numbers of old and new codes, have just been received and have been distributed to the officers of Fort Shafter. This is a most important government document.

A change has been made in the schedule of the Fort Shafter quartermaster bus. The bus going around to collect school children attending schools downtown will leave the Signal Corps barracks at 7:40 a. m., and go direct to the car station in front of the bachelor quarters instead of going to Kamehameha IV road and King street.

REGULAR ARMORY BALL ON SATURDAY EVENING

Sergt. Bruce W. Shelton, popular manager of the weekly armory dances, announces that the dance next Saturday night will not be a masquerade, but will be a regular ball. Music will be furnished by the Hawaiian band's glee club, and dancing will begin at 8 o'clock. Officers of the guard and their wives will chaperone the affair.

BATTALION FROM REGULARS TO GO ON ENCAMPMENT

Machine Gun Company Will Also Accompany Guard to Give Field Instructions

One complete battalion of soldiers from the regular army, besides a machine gun company from the field artillery, will participate with the troops of the 1st Infantry, National Guard, on the encampment between November 12 and 19.

Approval for this has been made by the commanding officer of the Hawaiian Department, the regulars going out for the purpose of instructing the guardsmen. Orders affecting the encampment are to be issued soon.

Company commanders are already making plans for big turnouts in their respective organizations, and it is believed that in the lull just before the winter holidays it will be found possible to get out a large number of men. It is doubtful now if the camp site first chosen will be kept. The vicinity near Koko Head may not furnish the proper quality or quantity of water, which will necessitate changing to another place. No announcement of this place has been made yet, but Red Hill, the site of former camps, is looked on as probable.

Guard officials point out that the sending of a regular company of machine gun troopers along with the guard will be a big boost for the men working under Capt. "Jack" Atkinson in this division. Pointers will be given in regular field work which should be of lasting benefit.

Each company of the guard will also have the services of a sergeant assigned to special duty with it.

ODD ROCK SPECIMEN MAY GO TO MUSEUM

Volcanic rock of a peculiar formation, said to be one of the most peculiar ever seen in Honolulu, was being shown by Charles S. Desky today. The rock had been brought to him by a Japanese working in the Waialae tunnel. When Albert F. Judd saw the specimen he suggested that it should be sent to the Bishop museum.

The peculiar specimen which Desky was displaying was honeycombed in appearance except that the combs were rectangular in shape, generally regular and sometimes in the form of squares. As Desky described it, it was as if the rock had formed over a wire screen. It was attached to ordinary rock of lime formation. In size it is about 10 inches in length, 6 in width and nearly the same in thickness.
