SCOUT MEMBERS MUST BE ALERT UNDER NEW LAW

SCOUTMASTERS TAKE NOTICE

If registered, a scout may—
 Hold his head high because of the consciousness that he is genuinely a scout;
 Enjoy scout fellowship;
 Receive recognition as a scout;
 Wear the scout uniform and badge;
 Share scout honors;
 Become a veteran scout.
 If unregistered—
 A boy is not a scout;
 Cannot fairly represent himself to be a member of the scout brotherhood;
 Cannot legally wear the scout uniform or badge;
 Cannot have the satisfaction that comes with the knowledge that he is playing the game according to the rules;
 He may lose time which in years to come would be valuable to him in establishing his title to Veteran Scout rank.

Recent legislation enacted by Congress compels the Boy Scouts of America to draw the line sharply between its members and non-members. Scouts who do not register promptly cannot be recognized as members. The importance of this commands the earnest attention of every scout official. The National Council desires the suggestions and an active cooperation of all the men in the field in making these laws effective.

ONCE A SCOUT, ALWAYS A SCOUT—this is the opportunity every boy now has.
