**MANY CLUBS ARE BEING STARTED AT THE Y. W. C. A.**

Portuguese Girls Meet Tonight to Organize; Three Other Clubs Already Formed

With three new clubs already started and the formation of two others under way the Young Women's Christian Association has begun its second year of extension work with every indication of a successful season.

Tonight the Portuguese girls' club will be organized for athletic and educational work, and a most cordial invitation is extended by the association to all Portuguese girls to come and assist in planning the year's work. Another club will be started next Tuesday at the Kakaako club.

Other clubs which have already been organized are at the upper Manoa Valley school and at the Kauluwela mission for girls between 10 and 16 years, and last week organization of a new club was begun at the Kalihi settlement for all girls over 16 years.

When these five clubs are all organized the association will have total of 14 clubs. The nine old clubs have a membership of 250 girls of all nationalities.

**F. M. SWANZY IS SERIOUSLY ILL FROM OVERWORK**

Francis M. Swanzy, managing director of Theo. H. Davies & Co. and president of the Honolulu Iron Works, is seriously ill at his home in Manoa Valley. He has not been at work for over two weeks, it is said at the office, and his physicians have ordered absolute rest and quiet.

Swanzy came to the islands nearly 50 years ago, and since that time has devoted his energies to the building up of solid business enterprises in Honolulu and Hawaii. No man on the islands is better known or liked and all his friends are hoping for his speedy return to business. He has been British vice-consul, twice president of the Sugar Planters' Association, president of the Sugar Factors and also officially interested in a number of sugar plantations.

T. Clive Davies, president of Theo. H. Davies & Co., has cabled that he is leaving England, October 28, and will be here the end of November. There has been no cable sent from here.

**ENTHUSIASTIC RALLY OF REPUBLICANS HELD LAST NIGHT AT PARK**

Approximately 2500 voters and their wives, friends and relatives attended the final rally of the Republican candidates held Friday evening at Aala Park. The meeting was one of the biggest political gatherings held in Honolulu in recent years and enthusiasm was rampant from the time Senator Charles Chillingworth called the voters to order until the last speaker had had his say.

About 30 speakers were on the platform and it was after 11 o'clock when the meeting adjourned. As one candidate said today, all of the G. O. P. aspirants to office feel assured of their success at the polls because of the intense enthusiasm displayed at Friday's meeting. Each speaker was allowed five minutes to make his personal appeal to the voters, and by this plan a series of rapid fire talks was kept up for more than three hours.

**PRECINCT MEETINGS HELD BY DEMOCRATS**

As a final preparation for today's primary election, Democratic candidates on Friday night held a series of meetings in precincts heretofore not visited by the aspirants to office. A joint meeting of the first, second and third precincts of the fourth district was held in the Moiliili school yard, while a meeting for the six and seventh precincts, same district, was held at the Magoon block. Four precinct meetings were held in the fifth district. Candidates report that all the meetings were well attended and that considerable enthusiasm was displayed.
