## CELEBRATION OF PAN-PACIFIC DAY IS BIG SUCCESS

There was evidently glory enough in it all for the Pan-Pacific Club, the Promotion Committee and the Hawaii board of education, for both in the San Diego and Los Angeles papers it is spoken of as the most successful of the receptions given during the exposition, and the school children's work sent down by the Pan-Pacific Club and the Promotion Committee, as well as the model school houses, have all taken the gold medal. The different exhibitors from Alaska and the Philippines have written their appreciation of the efforts of the Pan-Pacific Club of Honolulu to make the day in San Diego a big success. The officials of the exposition in San Diego also lent their cooperation.

Mrs. Frances A. Wentworth, in charge of the Pan-Pacific building, has written to the club here as follows:

"The plaza was prettily decorated and the ball enjoyed by all. I was worn to a frazzle, but have the satisfaction of hearing on every side that it was the nicest event of the season.

"I wish you would send a note of thanks to Mr. Morley, superintendent of grounds, for his kindness in sending me the palms and flowers free of charge, also to Mr. Pendleton for the loan of the musicians, and Mr. Otto Jeanson of the publicity department for his help in decorating. ## HARMFUL DYES BEING USED IN FRANKFURTERS

### Commissioner Hansen Finds That Little "Hot Dog" Has Colored Casing

Use of unpermitted dyes for sausage casings by no less than four large firms of Honolulu has led United States Food Commissioner A. W. Hansen to send out a letter of warning to all manufacturers of sausage in the territory. The sausage business is confined to Honolulu alone, however.

Recent inspections by the food commissioner have shown the presence of unpermitted coal tar dyes for the purpose of giving the sausage a smoky color, the dye being such that often it will permeate the meat around which the casing is stretched.

Mr. Hansen said today that there are eight colors permitted, providing the color be examined and certified by a commissioner, but that even in the use of these the manufacturer or dealer must so declare by label or tag. Other dyes are harmful, and furthermore are strictly against the law.

"One of our particular causes of alarm in local cases," said the commissioner today, "is the fact that the small frankfurter or hot-dog sausage is colored with harmful dyes.

"If the meat is the only part of the sausage eaten, the use of the dye would not be quite so serious," he says, "but in the frankfurter, where the casing is mostly always eaten with the sausage it is a different question."

The commissioner says that often the dye is put on thick enough to enable it to be washed off in hot water.

## CANNERY MERGER STOCK QUICKLY TAKEN IN MARKET

Relative to the quick and ready absorption of the stock of the new cannery merger, in which one Hawaii concern is interested, the San Francisco Chronicle of September 26 says: "There has never been a stock issue, it is safe to say, so well taken in this market as the cumulative preferred of the California Packing Corporation. Yesterday morning the issue was announced as sold, while nearly every member of the exchange had unfilled orders. In the afternoon 250 shares sold at 191, and the stock closed 191 bid, a price at which it is believed several thousand shares would be absorbed.

"In this connection it is well to remember that California Fruit Cannery sold at 125 on a dividend of 7.29 per cent, while Alaska Packers formerly sold above par on a 6 per cent dividend. All the assets of one corporation and more than two-thirds the assets of the other, to say nothing of the assets of three other corporations, are now security for this issue. California Fruit Cannery at par and 70 per cent of Alaska Packers stock at par aggregate nearly as much as California Packing Corporation preferred at par, without considering what the market price of the three other stock issues might have been."
