## RUGERITES WIN TWO GAMES AND WANT MORE TOO

### South Beats Brushers; Bruett Holds Ft. Kamehameha to Six Hits Sunday

The Fort Ruger ball tossers have returned to the "limelight" again and have started to make a new record for themselves as well as the teams on the island. A newly organized team, under the capable management of Lieut. Loomis, who is an ardent baseball fan, made their debut at Athletic Park Saturday afternoon when they took the strong squad of "Brushers" into camp in an 11-inning tilt, score 3 to 2. The performance was repeated again Sunday afternoon at Fort Kamehameha, the 4th Company of that place being the victims and the score was 4 to 2.

In Saturday's game, which was the best of the two, the Ruger boys seemed to have the best of the argument from the time the first ball was pitched until the last man was out in the eleventh inning, which, by the way, was Jackson. The game was a pitchers' battle and South outclassed Hollerbach two to one, striking out 14 batsmen and issuing one free pass, while Hollerbach sent only six men back to the water tank and walked four men and hit three. Both teams succeeded in getting a run across the plate in the first inning. Ruger scored again in the fifth and the Brushers in the sixth. This made the game exciting all the way through and it really looked as though it was anybody's game, yet the Brushers seemed to have that "funny" feeling that they were going to lose the game and the blow-up came in the eleventh inning, when Cummings, the first man up, connected for his third hit of the day. It was a long single to left, but Hollerbach played for a few seconds and Cummings went to third, and he attempted to steal third, but was caught in a run-up, in which the entire infield figured, but no one was backing Bell and Jackson left the plate to take the throw at third. This left home unguarded and the short toss of McGarry's being bad, Cummings slipped through and scored.

Womack got on after taking a fast one in the sixth and South secured a single, but no more scoring was done, as McClain fanned and Bailey was thrown out by the pitcher. South proved his superiority and his ability to use his head when he forced to him a McGarry and Jackson each. Amama, McGarry and Jackson each hit a slow grounder straight to the pitcher's box. South was in his best form and the press just returned from Benham, who was just returned from the states, seemed to have a great effect on his control and work in general. Hanna, Dawson and Stewart can each say that they broke up a rally by making star catches with two men out and the bases filled.

Sunday's game was a fast and exciting one, but was much different from the other one in that the battle was between the fielders and infielders, eight drives being handled by the fly-chasers and the infielders having 28 assists to their credit.

The Fort Ruger squad will be looking for some good teams to battle with as soon as they return from the annual hike on October 23, and any fast aggregation wishing a game can be recommended by getting in touch with either Sgt. South, 3rd Company; Sgt. Pruitt, 2nd Company, or Lieut. Loomis, post exchange, Fort Ruger.

The Ruger boys will meet one or two of the fast teams at Schofield this week and expect to make a good showing.

falls and Punahou takes the ball. Kaubane loses two yards and Peterson makes a poor punt to Mellin, who goes eight yards. Hicks makes 10 yards around end. Sleepy Baldwin came through and stopped Hicks. On the next play Brash threw a forward pass to Hicks, who ran for a touchdown. Goal failed. Score: Hawaii 12, Punahou 6.

Punahou kicks off to Kawamoto, who runs the ball back 25 yards. Hawaii loses the ball and Hawkins makes a good gain.

Noble Kaubane makes four on a tackle play. Peterson loses five yards, and Correa fails to gain through Barnhart. Correa makes four yards around left end, and Punahou is penalized for holding. # Shipping & Waterfront News

## CHINA ARRIVING AT DAYLIGHT; LARGE MAIL

## COLLIER BRINGS SUPPLIES FROM NORFOLK

With 535 bags of mail in her hold for Honolulu the China Mail steamer China, Captain Dobson, will arrive off port at daylight tomorrow and dock at Pier 7 about 7:30, steaming for Japan and China some time tomorrow afternoon, no hour having been mentioned by the captain in his radio received Sunday by the local agents, H. Hackfeld & Company. The China will take the next mail for the Orient.

Passengers for Honolulu coming from San Francisco on the China are five first-cabin, one second and one steerage. There is no freight for Honolulu and hardly any will be taken out. Passengers booked at Hackfeld's shipping department to leave on the steamer tomorrow afternoon are four or five cabin, four second and 50 steerage. The agents had expected the China would arrive this afternoon.

At the same time the China arrives the Oceanic steamer Ventura will show up off port from Sydney and Pago-Pago. She will dock at Pier 10 and steam at 11 o'clock tomorrow night for San Francisco, taking the next mail and 1500 tons of cargo from this port, mostly sugar and canned pines. Sugar taken will be 12,000 bags, canned pines 7500 cases and bananas 4000 bunches.

Radio advices received this morning by the shipping department of C. Brewer & Company, Oceanic agent, say the Ventura will arrive off port at 6:30 tomorrow morning with two cabin and four steerage passengers for Honolulu from Sydney and Pago-Pago. She has 14 sacks of mail and 37 tons of general cargo for this port.

**Anyo Maru Coming Friday**

A Marconigram received today by Castle & Cooke's shipping department from the San Francisco offices of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha says the T. K. K.'s South American liner Anyo Maru will arrive here Friday from the Orient with freight for Hilo and will reach San Francisco October 31 from the Big Island port.

**Siberia Has 1253 Tons**

The same message says the Siberia Maru has 1253 tons of freight for Honolulu and 275 Asiatics. This news and that about the Anyo was contained in cables from Japan to the T. K. K.'s San Francisco office. When the Siberia will arrive here from Yokohama is not known to the local agents, but she is expected Wednesday or Thursday. No radio from the liner was received this morning.

## HARBOR NOTES

Arrival at Astoria Sunday of the schooner Melrose from Kahului September 10, is reported.

Sunday the American ship John Ena sailed from a South American nitrate port with cargo for Honolulu.

Next mail from San Francisco will arrive tomorrow morning in the China Mail steamer China. She has 535 bags.

Late Saturday night the Inter-Island steamer Mauna Loa arrived from Maui bringing 22 cabin passengers and 105 bags of corn.

Another mail from San Francisco after the China Mail steamer China will arrive Wednesday morning in the Matson steamer Lurline, which has 250 bags.

The Matson steamer Matsonia returned from Hilo Sunday morning and will steam at 10 a. m. Wednesday from Pier 15 for San Francisco taking mail, passengers and freight.

Sunday morning the Standard Oil steamer La Primera returned from Port Allen, where she discharged package cargo. She steamed last night for San Francisco.

Late Saturday afternoon the schooner Beulah, Capt. H. Johannsen, arrived from Port Townsend with 433,600 feet of lumber for Lewers & Cooke, after a passage of 19 days.

Permission to sell the Philippine steamer Governor Forbes, here last spring, has been asked of the Philippine public utilities commission by her owners, Ynehausti & Company of Manila.
