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AD CLUB HEARS VIGOROUS TALKS FOR BOND ISSUE

In order to make progress, all of the methods of obtaining funds must be used in part, at least; the tax method if followed entirely will place a large burden on the present owners of property. Once that the tax rate is largely increased for a specific purpose, it is a marked tendency to maintain that rate thereafter irrespective of the fact that the specific purpose requirements may have been satisfied.

Funds Must Be Assured

Considering the most urgent city need, that of water and sewers enlargement, he said that funds to be obtained from bonds would be assured, whereas the tax rate increase plan does not now assure such funds, even though an emergency exists.

He then added:

It is our desire to be distinctly understood that we reserve our opinion as to any other issue of bonds in any other year than the present year until it can be seen what will be the result of legislative enactments in regard to the disposition of funds to be derived from taxation and as to the impounding, continuance, or release of certain funds now provided by law to be maintained.

As to whether bonds should be issued for roads and parks is a question as to the distribution of the burden of raising the funds and the rapidity with which the community desires the work to progress. If it should be necessary, that in order to obtain the necessary funds for the water and sewer systems, to meet the wishes of those desiring money from bonds for the roads, parks and baths, as a matter of compromise, then raise the entire sum of \$180,000 by issuance of bonds. However, our preference would be bonds for water and sewer systems only.

The present is a favorable time to sell bonds. Not in recent years has there been such a plethora of money. A city and county 5-15 5 per cent bond will sell say, to be conservative, on net to exceed a 4 1/2 per cent basis. While if funds are obtained from the increased tax rate some of the tax payers may be borrowing money from the banks at 6 per cent. The bond by its terms can be redeemed in five years when the city has adjusted its finance. The law should be amended so as to permit of the issuance of serial bonds payable yearly and redeemed by the high or low numbers. Early payment by the city is thus enforced, reducing the interest charge and the bonds last to be redeemed are known, thus running for a longer definite time will command a higher price. The Manoa improvement bonds would have sold at a higher price if the last provision had been available.

There are advantages as well as disadvantages to the increased tax rate plan. It has sometimes occurred that when the tax rate has been increased to provide funds for a specific purpose, the increased tax rate is maintained, although the requirements of the specific purpose may have long been satisfied. Much of the present opposition to the issuance of bonds arises and when the time arrives the same opposition to the increased tax will arise, from the thought in the mind of the business man that the city administration is top-heavy with overhead charges.

Some of the criticism leveled at the heads of the mayor and supervisors is undeserved and much is pertinent. County expenditures for gasoline, automobiles, automobile repairs, etc., and departmental administration is the basis for that which is pertinent. However this state of affairs may be, public improvement should proceed. The people ultimately have the corrective remedy in their own hands. The plan has been advanced for providing for the election of three supervisors for the 4th district, three for the 5th and one at large, thereby rendering it possible to obtain relatively the same number of businessmen on the board as in the house of representatives. Some businessmen may be induced to stand for a board election if dependent upon the electorate of the 4th district only and not upon the electorate of the entire island. Furthermore, once a mayor or a supervisor has been elected, place him on the defensive when a candidate for reelection, make him prove what he has done to reduce the overhead and waste and refuse to hear him on his promises for the next term.

APARTMENT HOUSE FOR WOMEN MAY BE BUILT IN HONOLULU NEXT YEAR

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An apartment house for women may be erected in Honolulu in the near future. At a meeting of the board of directors of the Y. W. C. A., held yesterday afternoon, the members voted to appoint a special commission to investigate the housing needs of the young women of the city.

At the present time the Homestead is filled to capacity, and many applicants have been turned away owing to lack of rooms. It is thought that there would be a demand for an apartment house for women, and this matter will be taken up when the report of the special commission is received in November.

At the meeting yesterday 96 new members were voted in, bringing the total membership to more than 1300. This shows a growth of 500 since the opening of the new building in January. There have been many calls for new clubs, and the number now active is 14, as against one a year ago. A new worker will be added to the staff at once.

QUEEN NOW HAS 3000 WORDS IN DICTIONARY SHE IS WORKING ON

More than 3000 words already have been placed in the English-Hawaiian dictionary which is being leisurely prepared by Queen Liliuokalani. In compiling this work the queen is taking words and phrases from ancient meles, many of which are not in use today, and translating them into English. She is using no authorities in her work, being considered one of the best Hawaiian scholars and authorities on things Hawaiian in the territory.

The last legislature made an appropriation for the compilation of a Hawaiian dictionary, naming the queen and Rev. Henry H. Parker, pastor of Kawaiahao church, to superintend the work. Rev. Mr. Parker has been working on the dictionary for several months.
