

BOOZE SELLING SOLDIERS MUST FACE ARMY TRIAL

If regular soldiers stationed on Oahu have been selling beer without a license recently in hopes of getting a "kick-out" of the army with a prison sentence from the civil authorities, they are likely to be disappointed hereafter. Liquor Inspector W. P. Fennell has been ordered by military authorities to turn over all such offenders to the army, which will probably deal more seriously with them.

J. G. Langley was the first soldier to come under this new order and he was given into the charge of a provost guard today after his case had been stricken from the police calendar. Langley was arrested in Iwilei last night by Fennell when the defendant is said to have sold beer for 50 cents a bottle.

Fennell believes the soldiers have not been selling the liquor for profit, but only to be arrested. He says they had no supply on hand and had apparently purchased only a few bottles, probably from Iwilei inmates, to sell to someone on Iwilei road when they thought the officers were looking.

TREASURY WARNS AGAINST TAKING POLITICAL COIN

Warning against activity in politics and the collection of contributions or assessments by federal officers and employees has just been issued by the secretary of the treasury and distributed to various offices or revenue collectors.

Collector John F. Haley of the local office has just received a copy of the warning, which bears the signature of Byron R. Newton, acting secretary, who visited here more than a year ago. The letter says:

"The department promulgates this warning with approval and especially cautions all the personnel under its jurisdiction against any violations of the laws, rules and regulations appertaining to political activity and the illegal collection or payment of political assessments or contributions. Violations thereof will be summarily dealt with."

Together with the letter are sent specific regulations from the civil service laws dealing with such activity.

She will arrive here November 4 or 5. No word has yet been received from the Venezuela, which was scheduled to leave San Francisco yesterday.

Word has been received from two men from here in the London Scottish regiment. Lance Corporal Alex. Hunter, brother of Mrs. Peter Gibb, Wahiawa, is recovering from shell shock, and V. Woodburn-Heron has recently received his first stripe and is now a lance corporal. Two more local boys, Frank Brohan and E. Shackleton, also in the London Scottish, were reported well in September.

Cabled advices today to the shipping department of C. Brewer & Co., local Oceanic agents, from the Oceanic's Sydney office says the Sonoma left Sydney today and has room for San Francisco from this port for only 960 tons of cargo and 3000 bunches of bananas. The reduced cargo room available is believed to be due to resumption of wool shipment from Australia for San Francisco.
