Nicholson caged nine field throws and Nott secured five.

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LIEUT. BRITTON TO COACH FAST COLLEGE SQUAD

West Point Star Will Handle Reins at College of Hawaii; Next Game on Friday

Saturday's game between the College of Hawaii and McKinley High School, which resulted in the college sweeping the field by 14 to 0, was a most satisfactory game. As a matter of fact the result was better than was expected, for McKinley High School outweighed the college by 164 pounds per man to 151 pounds. However, the game showed that while the team is picking up wonderfully there are still several defects that need correction, and if the events of the past few days are any criterion they must certainly will be speedily obliterated.

Lieut. Britton, first lieutenant of D Company, Engineers, Fort Shafter, who has not yet been in the islands two weeks, was secured as coach by the college football committee. Lieut. Britton is the biggest figure in football in the islands at present, for he acquired a wide reputation as West Point's star left halfback.

SHAFTER SQUAD WILL BE READY FOR HARD TILT

Second Infantry Gridiron Stars Show to Form Under New Coach; Britton Mentor

FORT SHAFTER, Oct. 25.—First Lieut. William H. Britton, 3rd Regiment of Engineers, to the great delight of the men interested in football at Fort Shafter, has taken charge of the squads in training. The lieutenant will train two teams, one that will be eligible to play representing the entire post and one to represent the second team. The post team will be a very formidable organization, as five veterans from last year's team have reported for work, a most valuable nucleus upon which to build, and the recruits who have reported for the first time this year are a powerful set of men. The first game will be played on Saturday and will put the team to the test and will show the material of which the Fort Shafter aggregation is composed as their opponents, the National Guard of Hawaii, are not only actively working under an excellent trainer, Capt. Midkiff, but several of the players like Braeh are stars of the first magnitude.

NATIONAL GUARD GRIDDERS STAGE HARD PRACTISE

The National Guard is holding regular practise every evening on Alexander Field. There is great need of it, for a team—not a group of stars with moulding reputations—is needed for Saturday's game, when the guard and the 2d Infantry teams clash.
