IMPROVEMENT KALAKAUA AVENUE IS ADVANCED

In order that there might be as little delay as possible in getting Kalakaua avenue improvement started, Peter Kanase, messenger, was sent to the Japanese consul's reception at the Young Hotel last evening to have Mayor John Lane sign the ordinance, which had just passed its third reading at the meeting of the board of supervisors.

When the bill was unanimously passed, Arnold said that he hoped the mayor would be present to sign it. Logan suggested that the messenger be sent to the reception, which immediately found favor with the other members, Hollinger offering his gold banded fountain pen.

Kanase returned at 9 o'clock and thereupon Arnold moved that the Spalding Construction Company's contract be accepted and signed and the company authorized to commence work at once, which was carried without dissent. Spalding's bid was \$96,290.

The King street extension ordinance also passed its third reading and will become a law when signed by the mayor. As the Lord-Young Engineering Company has already done half the work no haste was necessary.

LACK OF CEMENT STOPS WORK ON HONOLULU ROADS

A resolution was passed by the board of supervisors last evening authorizing the issuing of bonds to the amount of \$28,000 to take care of the Beach Walk improvement district No. 2. The bonds are to be issued in denominations of \$500 each, dated September 19, 1916, and payable September 15, 1925, but they will also be subject to call September 15, 1917. The interest on the bonds will be 5-1/2 per cent payable semi-annually. The resolution passed without argument. According to the accounts of the tax collector, \$4762.88 have been paid in from assessment which leaves \$28,007.58 to be paid in nine years.

Following the passage of this resolution it was asked how soon work on Beach Walk could begin and George Collins, city engineer, said that due to the scarcity of cement it would not be restarted in all probability before the first of the year.

At 9 o'clock this morning the schooner Salvator sailed for San Francisco taking a cargo of canned pineapples to the coast for Libby, McNeill & Libby.

'BILL' GREGER, INSPECTOR, HAS FIGHT AT PIERS

Harbor Board Official Gets Blacked Eye in Mix This Morning

Tense feeling which has been developing at Piers 8 and 9 for some time between William Greger, territorial inspector and officials and employees of the Lord-Young Engineering Company, came to a climax this morning in a fight between Greger and one or more workers on the job.

Conflicting reports are told as to the number of men participating in the fight, which waxed extremely warm, one version being that no less than seven men attacked the inspector as he arrived on the scene this morning. The other report, and that given by Ed Lord, president of the Lord-Young Engineering Company, is that only one man attacked Greger, this being Victor Ives.

Lord told the Star-Bulletin today that the fight rose over trouble at a dance last night between the two men.

"It was a man-to-man scrap," he said, "I while others of my men looked on and saw that there was fair play on both sides, Ives alone did the fighting. He is only a young fellow, but was not injured." Greger received a black eye, according to territorial officials, who had heard of the fight. Chairman Forbes of the harbor board and his assistant engineer, Wilbur C. Woodward, made a hurried call at the construction site as soon as they heard of the fight, but would not give out any statements regarding it.

VISITOR TO IWILEI SUFFERS BAD BRUISES

Because he got in the way of a flying china pitcher Clyde Powell, a soldier, was brought to the emergency hospital Tuesday night as a result of disorders in Iwilei. When his bruised head was dressed he refused to prefer charges against the woman who had thrown the crockery, saying she had not intended to strike him, and no arrest was made.

The police say that a gang of drunk in-mates then teased one of the pitcher and hurled it into their ranks. Her missile went wide and struck an innocent bystander.

MAKES PURCHASING TRIP
Joe Bornstein left in the Wilhelmina this morning for San Francisco, Chicago and New York, where he will purchase and bring stock of clothing, hats and furnishings for Ed. B. Webster's new store, to be opened January 1, 1917, in a location at Hotel and Fort street, which will be remodeled prior to that date. Ed. B. Webster secured Bornstein's services as buyer on October 3.

An operation from which he is recovering successfully was performed this morning upon William Lishman whose leg was broken in an automobile accident about six weeks ago in the lane leading from Kalakaua avenue to the Seaside Hotel.

IWILEI REMAINS OPEN ALTHOUGH SOME MOVE AWAY

Despite Known Removals Police Do Not Admit Report There Will Be Exodus

Iwilei did not close last night; so far as disorder and disturbance was concerned it was more open than ever, although several inmates had already moved away and more are planning to do so. Two or three women in houses on the Ewa side of Iwilei road darkened their doors upon receipt of orders to do so from their landlords, but the whole Waikiki section was in full swing and it is generally understood that the landlords there propose to fight ejection of their tenants.

The police generally belittle any stories that the inmates are moving away or that there is any concerted intention of doing so. Sheriff Rose says he has heard of no girls moving away from Iwilei and consequently has made no extra provisions to watch their movements up-town.

Although most of the Japanese women were ordered out of Iwilei by their landlords some are still living there, according to a Japanese doctor who once attended them. Reports from Japanese circles talk of those who have left Iwilei going to various houses in town and several are said to have started business at plantation camps about the island.

Meanwhile the citizens behind the movement to close up the disorderly district are taking measures to see that landlords who continue to allow houses of vice are prosecuted in the courts. They have been served with notice that they must clean up or close up by today or else face prosecution. Today, therefore, and tonight should tell whether the vice landlords, women and their hangers-on intend to get out or stay.

WOMEN OF IWILEI CARVE AND BITE IN FIERCE FIGHT

Two denizens of Iwilei, on the eve of their proposed ejection from the district, so severely carved each other in a cutting affray there early this morning that once Marie Franklin, is at the Queen's hospital in a swathe of bandages and another, Dorothy Palmer, is under arrest at the police station for investigation.

The police are not certain how the fight started. Chief McDuffie of the detectives is today interviewing the Franklin woman at the Queen's hospital in hopes of obtaining a connected story of the affair.

Both women were brought to the emergency hospital about 5 o'clock this morning, bleeding severely. The Franklin woman had a cut three inches long and two inches deep on her back, a wide bite on her leg and a smaller cut on her left hip and shoulder. The Palmer woman had a bite on the left wrist, her right wrist was sprained and both knees were bruised. Policeman James V. Crowell made the arrests. Police Surgeon R. G. Ayer says the cuts were made with a sharp instrument although broken bottles were found near the scene of the fight.
