GOVERNOR ASKS VACATIONS FOR GUARD MEMBERS

Requesting that all territorial employees who are members of the 1st Infantry, National Guard, be given leave by heads of the various offices to attend the joint encampment with troops of the regular army at Red Hill from November 19 to 26 inclusive, Governor Pinkham has written to officials under him. He states that employees thus absent will be given full pay for this time.

"In accordance with the general policy of the administration," says the letter, "and in consideration for the sentiment throughout the territory for a thoroughly efficient National Guard for local and national defense and good order, it is desired that all employees of the territory who are members of the National Guard participating in this encampment, be granted leaves of absence for the time required for this important military training.

"Leaves of absence for the purpose of military training will be with full pay. Heads of departments are directed to cooperate to the fullest extent possible."


